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Heritage Open Day

Saturday, 13 September
Village Hall 10am - 2pm

Holme upon Spalding Moor Local History Society and other invited groups from the village will have displays. The focus will be on World War 1 because of the 100th anniversary. There will be information available about the 40 men from the village who died and also many more who survived. If anyone has anything they would like to contribute to this, please bring the information to the Village Hall. The Holme Local History Society will have a scanner so anyone can have their photographs or documents scanned for the digital archive and take their originals home on the day. There will also be an archaeology display.



Other on-going projects by the Holme Local History Society include: vicars and Methodist Ministers of Holme, shops and pubs, carnival queens and enclosure of farms in the 18th century.

Future meetings include:

Monday, 22 September, Chris Cade on the Railway King. Chris is an actor and he is going to play the part of George Hudson (in costume), telling his story.

Monday, 20 October, Phil Judkin on Zeppelin! 76 Squadron and Yorkshire Air Defences, WW1. Phil gave an excellent talk last year on 76 Squadron, who were based at the airfield in WW2. He is Co-Chairman of the 76 Squadron Association Committee and every year they meet at the airfield to lay a wreath.

Meetings start at 7pm in the Social Club and admission is £2.

As many will know one of our Parish Councillors, Chris Worrall, has been sent to prison for 7 years, the Parish Council has sought advice from the East Riding of Yorkshire Council over this issue for many weeks and a formal notice about a vacancy on the Parish Council will be announced when possible. This year's Macmillan Coffee Morning takes place on:

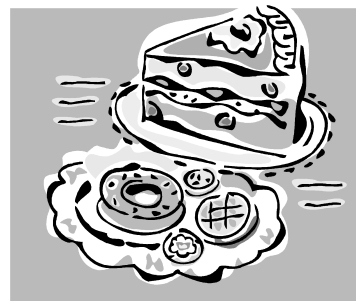

Parish Council Meetings

Residents are able to see the Parish Council in action at monthly meetings that are usually held at the Methodist Church Hall on Selby Road every third Wednesday at 7:30pm, the next meetings are on **Wednesday 20 August, 17 September and 15 October**. Everyone is welcome and there is a public session at the start of every meeting, if you wish to speak in the public session, please contact Steve Young, Clerk to the PC, five days before the meeting to get booked in.

In addition to the meetings, the PC holds “Surgeries” on the Saturday before a meeting, to allow anyone to have access to Parish Councillors who are in evidence to listen to concerns and views. Planning applications and decisions are available to view. Our Ward Councillor Victoria Aitken will usually be available. If any person has any concerns re: anti-social behaviour in Holme on Spalding Moor or any other issues they feel the Police need to know about, one of our Police Community Support Officers Bill Mell or Simon Smith will be available to discuss them, subject to work commitments. The next surgeries are on **Saturday 16 August, 13 September and 11 October all between 10am and 12 noon in The Coffee Shop**, in The Courtyard opposite the Blacksmiths Arms. So if you have concerns or questions then please come down to the Coffee Shop Surgery.

Anyone wishing to: receive notice of meetings and/or a copy of the agenda by email; give notice to speak at a meeting; wishes to view current planning applications or any PC document they can contact Steve, Clerk to the PC. If you have any questions, problems or concerns you can contact either Steve or any Parish/Ward Councillor (all contact details are on page 3).

The PC minutes are printed in the HOSM Grapevine newsletter and are also placed on the 3 village notice boards. The newsletter is distributed to some 1200 homes in the village, the Clerk will email this to you, on request, if you email him at steveyoungclerk@gmail.com. Other important local information is also put into the newsletter. Environment Agency Contact Telephone Numbers

Environment Agency telephone numbers to report environmental problems, if you notice unpleasant smells in the village, please telephone to log the incident. Free mobile number **03001231239**, Landline number **0800 807060**.

Street-light and Pot-hole Problems

If you notice a street-light not working please either phone the number on the lamp-post, report it via the East Riding of Yorkshire Council website or email Steve the Clerk with the name of the road, the location and the number on the lamp-post. The East Riding of Yorkshire Council is responsible for our street-lights and will rectify all problems. Pot-holes are the bane of our lives and the East Riding of Yorkshire Council is again responsible for repairing them, it appears that in cold weather they only make a temporary repair which is then done properly once the road surface is warmer. To report problems ring **01482 887700** and ask for Highways or report via the East Riding of Yorkshire Council website with exact location and if possible a picture, the picture seems to help get the repair done more quickly!!

Crime Prevention

The Parish Council has been looking at getting a supply of low cost door chains that could be fitted very easily to front doors, if these are kept on all the time then they act as a deterrent to undesirables knocking at the front door and give confidence to residents to say no to callers they do not want. If residents are interested in this idea please log this interest with the Clerk, Steve or any Parish Councillor.

Doggie Bag Dispensers and Litter Bins

The two new litter bins have been sited one outside the Post Office and one on Back Lane and the village is now well covered with bins, the new doggie bag dispensers are being well used. Hopefully this will give no excuse for litter and dog mess to spoil our environment, most of the litter and dog mess is left by local people despoiling their own environment.

Yorkshire Water

The PC was asked about the number of tankers being used by YW at the pumping station at Sands Lane/Hawthorne Drive, they say that they had a problem with the pumps that has now been rectified so normal operations have resumed. For future problems could residents local to the pumping station please contact Thomas Phillips of Yorkshire Water to report problems or check on tankering, 07790 617369.

Summer activities

As reported in the last edition of The Grapevine Bethany Jenkins is compiling a list of places to go and things to see that may be useful for parents over the Summer holiday, Bethany has started a web-site www.hosmactivities.co.uk with information on it. Flags

Watch out for flags flying in the village on special days to help us all get in the party mood.

Horses

The Parish Council has had concerns expressed about horse droppings left on roads and asks that horse owners are considerate when riding in the village.

Grass in the village

The Parish Council has written again to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council complaining at the poor service standards of maintenance of our grassed areas. The Village in Bloom entry will hopefully happen next year and the flower beds/planters/baskets are making the village look good, the poor standard of grass cutting is detracting from the hard work done by our local team. The Parish Council has asked to adopt grass cutting so that it can be done to a high standard.

Gallymoor roundabout

Parish Councillors are very concerned at the poor state of this roundabout compared to the one at Shiptonthorpe and others in the East Riding, again the Parish Council has asked for action to bring this up to standard.

Land behind housing on Cherry and Chestnut, known as Back Field

Residents have requested that this area be brought more into use for local people, it being a long way from the Village Hall residents believe a play ground for children would be good for this area. An e-petition has attracted almost 100 hits and a paper petition also has 12 signatures. A presentation was made by residents at the July Parish Council meeting and the supporters have arranged for East Riding of Yorkshire Council play officers to make a site visit to assess the suitability for a children's play ground. The Parish Council has also discussed this issue and is in the process of trying to establish ownership of the area. The Parish Council plans to consult with residents backing onto the grassed area and will check out what grants are available before making outline plans for discussion.

Grounds Maintenance Person

Steve Deere was offered the job after interviews held in June, Steve will be working 8 hours per week and will focus on litter control for half of his time and the rest of his hours will be used in supporting the Village in Bloom project plus severe weather work as needed. He will also work alongside our handyman Peter2 Wiles on two man jobs, we are lucky to have our two man team of people who are very community minded and look after our village so well.

Christmas is coming.....

Plans are being made to make the Christmas event special and also to look at ways to make our village look its best at Christmas and to spread festive cheer!! The Parish Council will be holding a series of meetings to make plans, if you would like to get involved please either contact the Clerk, Steve or any Parish Councillor or come along to the first meeting in the Methodist Church Hall at 6pm on Monday 11 August.

HOSM In Bloom has now progressed to 15 flower beds and 30 lamppost mounted tubs and hanging baskets, we have had two of the flower beds adopted by the WI who will weed and water the beds on rocking horse green, we also have volunteers who will weed the beds on Baileywood/Back Lane corner, if anyone else in the village can help with weeding or watering beds or baskets please call Peter Hastings on 860873, we would also like any suggestions for further flower beds.

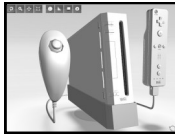
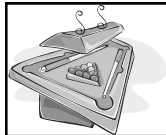

Dear Residents,

As always, everyone is busy in Howdenshire and there are lots of summer Gala's and community events going on and of course we are still battling the big issues.

The Community Support Day was a great success and thank you for all the hard work put into making so good.

I spoke at Full Council last month calling for officers to be firmer about enforcement issues at the Gilberdyke Landfill Site and I have my fingers tightly crossed that we may get some results over the next 6 months. The Operator does appear to be able to slip and slide through the system without being pinned down.

The River Valley Wind Farm enquiry is now being considered and we are hoping that a result will be given late summer. There are very big issues with regard to the already passed wind farms, now having achieved their goal of approval, they now want to increase the rota splay by about 18%. This in real terms means the blades are not only bigger and a bigger eye sore but potentially creating more flicker and more noise, as they will sweep closer to the ground and to each other. The actual height will not change but the impact will dramatically change.

Flooding issues are high on the priority list as ever and I would like to thank the ERYC team for all the amazing work they have done working with the MPs from across the region. David Davis lead a debate in Parliament on this subject before recess. All our fingers are again tightly crossed in the hope that the treasury find the funding for improved flood defences. £888 million is a lot of money but worth every penny!

There have been worrying events in Brighton village due to the problem of HGV lorries following SAT NAV instructions and getting stuck, making dangerous 10 point turns among residential properties. Another thank you this time to Highway Maintenance, for them agreeing to put new signage to help direct the lorries in the right direction. Local businesses have engaged very well with us and are doing what they can to inform drivers to use the correct route. I look forward to seeing the signs in place.

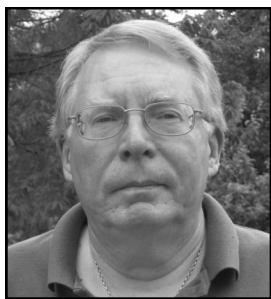

Talking of Holme, a friend I used to work with years ago phoned and asked how we liked the rural life. 'All bloomin' tractors an' cow shit, I expect!' he remarked flippantly. It got me thinking about just what we do like about living here. I explained that yes, we do have quite a few tractors, but no, we don't have very many cows around here at all – at least not of the bovine species anyway.

The term 'concrete jungle' came to mind and that really does epitomise city life – rows of regimented houses all of the same boring design; inner ring roads with all the pollution they bring; endless noise of cars and trucks; pointless defacing graffiti; litter and rubbish blowing everywhere. Although we lived in the suburbs, in the height of the holiday season there wasn't more than three minutes without a Jumbo jet overhead coming in low to land at Birmingham Airport. There was always the constant wail of police-cars or fire-engines in the distance whooping their way to incidents. In certain parts of the city one avoided eye contact, and you daren't offer a good morning without people looking at you as if you were insane – it just isn't done! And everyone is always in a rush – no time for anything.

What a blessing it is to live in a village like Holme. People care, and we all know each other, be it by nodding acquaintance or sight. We are a real community, although over the years we've been here I do feel that sadly Holme is gradually loosing that village feel.

Nevertheless where else would you have a neighbour's chickens wandering round your garden – I like chickens, they have personalities and they were no trouble. Sadly a fox put pay to some of them from what I understand. I quite miss them. We named one Henrietta.

Let's face it when I think, we've had our fair share of wildlife where we are situated. A couple of Christmases ago I looked in the snow and thought 'those are large footprints – not from a crow or a blackbird, so what the hell are they?' They were in fact from a Moor-hen who took advantage of our hospitality for a few weeks – even bringing his/her mate!

Just lately we have a family of crows nesting in the tree over the road - Arrg as I call the dad. He has three kids, all with a few white feathers. Bit of fraternisation I suspect with a magpie, who also visits . . . hmmm. Does Mrs Arrrg suspect, I wonder??

We have field-mice, the odd rat; a hedgehog even – all benign creatures, even my bird box has been taken over as a wasp's nest. (As long as they leave me alone, I'll leave them alone!)) and even a bee's nest situated underneath my workshop - however by far the worst creature. . . (*Cue: theme music from Jaws!*) was the mole! Tried everything from traps to bottles on sticks – all a failure: thankfully my neighbours friend sorted it with the '*final solution!*' I'll leave that to your imagination.

My sister, aged 72, hearing about the mole and listening to my somewhat caustic comments on the creatures, went all soppy and explained that moles were lovely little creatures with velvet overcoats and didn't really do any harm. Ha! Living in York she has never experienced a mole and the damage they can do. Sweet furry little critters my foot!! She's still bewitched by *Tales of the Riverbank* and *Toad of Toad Hall* and all that stuff – every time in walk on the back lawn I feel my heels sinking into the extensive warren the little devil has created. I love nature, but sometimes yer just has to do what yer gotta do!

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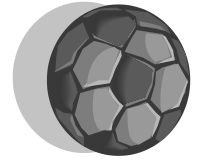
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Holme Rovers Football Club

Holme-upon-Spalding Moor gets its own team of lifesavers

Local people trained to become Community First Responders following successful fundraising appeal by two local girls

Community is coming first in Holme-upon-Spalding Moor this month after Yorkshire Ambulance Service NHS Trust (YAS) worked with local volunteers to launch a Community First Responder scheme in the village.

Community First Responders are volunteers living in local communities across the region who are trained in basic life support, cardio pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and oxygen therapy.

These community-minded locals are equipped with a kit which includes oxygen and an automated external defibrillator (AED) to help patients in a medical emergency such as a heart attack, collapse or breathing difficulties until an ambulance arrives.

Local schoolgirls Emma Roberts and Lydia Adrian sparked interest in the village when they raised almost £1,300 to provide Holme-upon-Spalding Moor with its own AED. Inspired by the community spirit shown by the young baton-twirling fundraisers, villagers got in touch with YAS to look into setting up their own Community First Responder scheme and the Trust provided training and support to get the Scheme off the ground.

Emma and Lydia organised several events to reach their fundraising target, including taking part in a baton twirling performance at Le Petit Café, holding cake sales, first aid courses and dance classes.

Ben Rushworth, Community Defibrillation Trainer for the area at Yorkshire Ambulance Service said:

“Community First Responders offer an invaluable contribution to their communities and we’re delighted to be setting up a scheme in Holme-upon-Spalding Moor. Emma and Lydia have done a superb job raising money for the village to have its own AED and the Scheme will mean we have trained volunteers on hand to ensure this life-saving piece of kit can swing into action if required.

“The first few minutes are critical in a medical emergency and access to effective treatment really does save lives. Being a Community First Responder can be extremely rewarding and I would encourage anyone who may be interested in taking on the role to get in touch.

“As volunteers are based within their local community they may only be a minute or two away from a medical emergency and very often their role is to simply provide reassurance to patients and their families until ambulance clinicians arrive. However, in extreme cases, such as a heart attack, they can perform CPR or use their defibrillator to restart a person’s heart which could save a life.

“Our volunteers come from all walks of life and the Scheme provides access to first-class training and the opportunity to gain experience and help your local community.”

The Holme-upon-Spalding Moor group is now looking for more volunteers to be a part of the initiative. Volunteers must be over 18 years of age, physically fit, and hold a full driving licence with no more than three penalty points. Full training will be given to successful applicants on completion of a full Disclosure Barring Service (DBS) check.

Rogue Traders/ Bogus Callers

Message from our PCSO Bill Mell

Over the last 2 months there have been several calls to the Police regarding ‘Bogus Officials’, ‘Rogue Traders’, etc... in and around the Holme on Spalding Moor area. The classic MO (modus operandi) is cold calling to offer their services to carry out work on YOUR garden, driveway or your roof then charging extortionate prices and demanding more money than was first agreed. They also fail to return to complete the work agreed upon.

It is very rare these days for genuine trades persons to cold call but if you do come across this there are certain rules they have to abide by:

- They must give 7 days cancellation notice
- Give a written quote
- Have a contact telephone number and more importantly, a contact address

No money should be exchanged prior to the work being carried out. If the trades person offers to take them to the bank, threatens, intimidates or are aggressive towards them they should call the Police immediately.

If you want work carried out, use known reputable firms, or people recommended personally to you. Genuine people will always give written estimates of the work.

Always ensure that the tradesman is licensed to remove the waste. If they are not, and they dump it illegally you may be liable to prosecution.

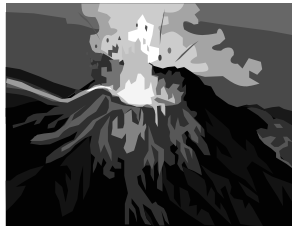
Playdough

Put 1 cup of cold water, 1 cup of salt, 2 teaspoons vegetable oil, and some food colouring in a bowl and mix. Gradually add 3 cups of flour until the mixture resembles bread dough. Keep in the fridge when not being used to make snakes, dogs, cars, elephants, sausages....

For the older children

Possibly the most rewarding thing you and your kids will ever do in the kitchen. 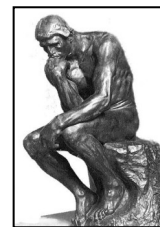

Random Jottings

This month I thought I would write about recollections we have of shopping in Holme (also our parents memories of this).

Starting at the Water End part of Holme Ernest's parents used to talk about Mrs Robinson having a shop at Water End selling home made bread and baking and other basic groceries. She was a lady who had been widowed and in those days pre-Welfare State had to make a living to house and feed her family. She was also a "Huckster", that is a person who bought produce etc. from people who had amounts too small to take to sell themselves so a Huckster would gather them all together and then trade them, usually in those days from Holme going to Selby Market. A horse and cart would be the usual form of transport, if not then the public bus.

From what Mrs Clifford Harrison told me about Mrs Robinson she must have been a really enterprising and industrious lady. I have a newspaper cutting of a funeral in 1948 of a Mrs Southgate of Water End aged well into her 80's and quoted as "carried on the business of Huckster at Selby till not long before she died". In those days, first half of 20th century, there were a number of small farms in the Parish whose wives would regularly take eggs, butter, dressed and feathered poultry and such things to Market for selling. The mode of transport was mainly public bus. Ernest's mother talked about going on an open topped bus which wouldn't be too good in inclement weather. There was one particular lady who had what one would call a "short fuse" and if anything went wrong on the bus, say going over a bad patch of road for example and baskets and boxes being dislodged she would be very fiery! I won't mention her name but nobody of that family lives in Holme today. We surmise that in the earliest days horse drawn public transport would be the norm. Ernest recalls Mr & Mrs Jack Laverack (Edwin's parents) at Common Farm having a very good pony and trap which was well capable of a there and back trip to Selby. He also has vivid memories of his mother using butter pats to shape the newly churned butter, presumably she took her surplus from what went to Uncle Ernest's shop in Leeds to Selby. The ritual of going to Selby every Monday continued with Mrs Smith like many others, well after they had finished taking goods to sell. Sorry I have digressed from shops! The next site of a shop as we travel along Selby Road was Mrs Hodgsons at Selby Road Station Lane junction. She sold all manner of groceries, bread, sweets, tobacco etc and must have had a really big trade from Northern Dairies workers after it opened in 1937, although she was trading well before then. We knew her very well as she was first cousin to Ernest's father (the Foster family connection). Mr Harold Hodgson was a joiner and also kept poultry, I well remember his poultry arks in the field at the corner towards Water End. Apart from their business activities they were both very active in village life, Parish Council, Holme Gymkhana, Parochial Charity etc. for Harold, WI for Annie as well as the Church for them both.

After retirement, having no children, they went to live near a niece in Hutton Cranswick. We recall visiting Mrs Hodgson in a Residential Home at Bridlington only a very short time before she died at just short of 100 and she was very alert and interested in hearing all about Holme.

After the Hodgson's retirement in 1964 Les and Elsie Stephenson came from York with their daughter Judith, Elsie (another charming lady) ran the shop and Les became Holme School Caretaker as well as keeping some livestock and growing produce, selling his surplus in the shop—just like the Hodgson's they became involved in village life. Judith (now Bell) was relating an anecdote to me recently, Les and Elsie had a golden retriever dog and this dog realised that if he placed himself strategically outside the shop he could get a lick from an ice-cream cornet which the children had bought in the shop, no fool that dog! After the Stephenson's retirement in 1977 a couple called Bradshaw bought the shop, after a few years they left and sold to Jenny & Alan Baker, after a short while they closed the shop and it returned to being part of the house in about mid 1980's.

Travelling along towards the village there was at one time a cobblers shop, in a shed at the Bungalow where Beryl Pitts now lives, the one with the lovely garden, I don't recall this cobblers but Ernest does.

Just before the Pit/Selby Road junction for a while in the 1930's Mrs Denness had a fish and chip business at a cottage which stood where Milestone Bungalow is now built.

Where the cottage stands (now being renovated) in the angle of the Pit/Selby Road junction I remember as a child a man being there who sold antiques and second hand furniture and goods, his wares always fascinated me, his was the kind of place we see being visited on TV Antiques programmes. Keith Townend told me that he did some work on the cottage for John Mason in early 1950's and made what had been a saddlers shop into a kitchen for the cottage, neither of us have any recollections of that and don't remember parents mentioning it but it must have been a saddlers at some time.

Also on that island of land and facing the school was Mrs Mason's shop, everyone who lived in Holme pre. 1950 must remember it. She sold bread, flour, yeast, cigarettes and paraffin for oil lamps, all in that one shop room! When entering the front door a bell would tinkle and Mrs Mason would come down the passage from the kitchen to serve. I remember she always wore slippers (when I remember her she must have been quite elderly), they were the kind that turned down at the sides and were fixed with buttons. Ernest says he used to call for 5 woodbines when he was a teenager on his way to the pictures at the Institute. I recall our mother buying a fresh bread loaf for tea, put it in the car with myself and sister Jennifer and when we got home to Wholsea Farm she found a loaf shell, we had been hungry and scooped out the fresh bread and eaten it on the way home, we got into trouble for that!

Mr Mason carried on business as a Blacksmith in the yard at the rear, Keith told me that he demolished the building that housed the Blacksmith's shop when extending the property for living accommodation when he and Kate married and moved to the premises.

Mrs Mason's premises took over the double fronted cottage nearest Selby Road and the other cottage at Runner End side was a separate dwelling, Ernest's grandparents Richard & Elizabeth Smith lived there with 4 children in the 1880's. As mentioned Keith & Kate Townend moved into the property soon after 1960 and extended it to a much larger shop. Keith was always very proud of his cheese and meat counter, it was an excellent and well patronised shop. Keith says a Mrs Martin (Mrs Mason's cousin) lived in the cottage for a little while before he extended the premises. Betty Harrison and Frances Butler worked in the shop for many years and I remember when we at Sandhill Farm if Ernest was going into the village he would get any shopping I needed and if I wanted some fabric conditioner he took great delight in going into the shop and telling Betty and Frances he wanted some "Comfort". The shop has changed hands several times since Keith's retirement and is now one of the 2 McColl Supermarkets in the village, that site must have been a retail outlet for over a hundred years.

Opposite the school Mr Wynn Eland ran a boot and shoe repair business as well as selling a wide range of footwear for all the family. He repaired in a building at the back and had a wooden building for selling new footwear, in later years he also sold household linens and knitwear in the building at the village side of the house. (I mentioned in previous jottings Mr Eland's travelling shoe shop.) Eric Shaw learned his trade as a cobbler with Mr Eland and later set up his own business next to the New Inn at Stockhill. Mrs Eileen Eland had a sweet and tobacco shop in what would once have been the front room of the cottage , as a child I loved to see her make the paper bag to put my sweets into, cone shaped with a twist to hold the bottom and a fold over top. Ernest says Mrs Sergison had a sweet shop in one of the cottages before the Eland family were there and Percy Riley told me a Miss Emily Smith also had a shop there. What chronological order I am not sure.

Following Mr Eland's death Mrs Eland moved down Selby Road and Jim and Judy Egan had a D.I.Y. store before they moved away, since then the property has ceased to be retail premises.

Just as an aside to the Elands and their shop keeping, Mrs Eland was a gifted pianist and played with a band, as well as on her own, for Dances and other social occasions in the area, also she was pianist for W.I. meetings for a number of years.

I will just pop round the corner to Runner End, Margaret Hobson has a wool, DIY etc. shop in what were outbuildings of the old Stewart family home Chapel Farm, there was no shop there before Margaret. I do remember part of the shop was the wash house with a big copper in the corner. I am told there was a shop run by Mr Roantree in the 1920's almost opposite Chapel Farm where a small cottage stood before being demolished and the present bungalow built. I am unable to make any comments as neither of us have any recollections of it nor heard anything from our parents.

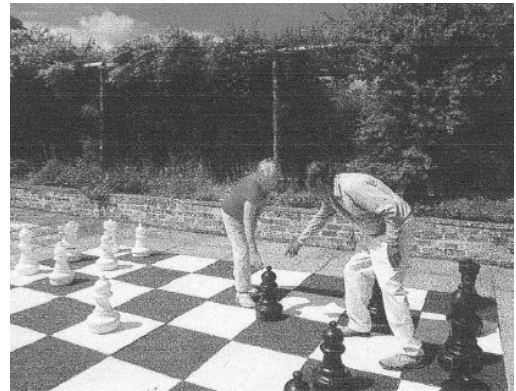

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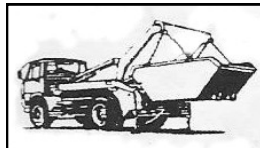
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Recipe: Carrot Cake

Ingredients

Cake

6fl oz/175ml corn oil
6oz/175g sugar
3 eggs
8oz/225g grated carrot
1tsp/5ml mixed spice

Topping

3oz/90g cream cheese
8oz/225g icing sugar

6oz/175g plain flour
4oz/115g pecans grated
1tsp/5ml bicarbonate of soda
1tsp/5ml baking powder
1tsp/5ml salt

2oz/50g butter



You will need 2 x 20cm/8inch diameter cake tins lined with greaseproof paper. Alternatively loaf tins can be used, take care to only fill half way, or the mixture can be made into muffins. A food processor is handy for grating the carrots and pecans although not essential. For fan ovens reduce the temperature by 20°C.

Method

Turn the oven onto 180°C Gas 6 Beat together the corn oil, sugar and eggs until creamy. Add all other ingredients. Spoon the mixture into your chosen tins, cook until top of cake is springy to touch. Allow to cool, then blend the ingredients for the topping. A little of the grated pecans looks nice sprinkled on top.

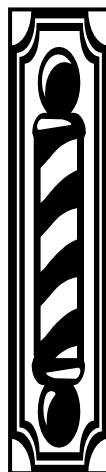
