7.2.3 22/00215/PLF- Erection of a general-purpose agricultural building and construction of hardstanding area and upgrade of existing access (AMENDED DESCRIPTION AND PLANS) at Land South of Beechwood Market Weighton Road for Mr Jordan Hampton. The Parish Council have no comment to make regarding this application provided Highways are content. They do note however, that the latest communication from the Drainage Board remains an objection.

7. SPONSORSHIP OF FLOWER BEDS

The Clerk advised that Mike Worsey had spoken to Men in Sheds and asked them to provide a quote to provide 8 sponsorship markers for the flower beds, however, he had not received a response. A couple of alternative suppliers were suggested including Goddard's. The Clerk also raised the issue of Mike Worsey's continued access to the Parish Council Website as an administrator. Given that he was no longer a Councillor the access would need to be revoked and he would need to pass over the list of email addresses that he held for individuals who had requested an emailed copy of the Grapevine. Cllr. Dave Marsh stated that he would be happy to upload information forwarded by Mike regarding the Grapevine and email copies to those that had requested it.

8. INFORMATION EXCHANGE

Cllr Laverack advised that on 2 occasions a dog owner had allowed his dog to foul the footpath outside his shop and had not cleared up the dog mess. These incidents had both been caught on the shop's CCTV camera. When he contacted the Dog Warden at ERYC to raise a complaint, he had been advised that they had 10 working days in which to provide a response which he felt was an unacceptable length of time to wait.

Cllr. Hobson advised that the 30 and 40 mph signs on the approach to the village at the turning to Harswell were obliterated by overhanging trees and bushes. The Clerk will report this to ERYC.

Cllr. Waudby advised that Richard Brook has been elected as the new chairman of the Village Hall.

Cllr. Smith advised that Arglam Lane needed repairing along the full length of the road. The Clerk will report this to ERYC. (Cllr. Dowson has now provided report numbers for Arglam Lane,

Baileywood Lane and Bulmer Lane to the Clerk when she had reported these issues previously to ERYC) The Clerk will report these issues again to ERYC.

Cllr. Johnson advised that the 'sink hole' on the High Street continues to be a problem despite being recently repaired again. The Clerk will draft a letter from the Chairman to the Highways Dept expressing concern about this long-standing issue and ask what their intentions are to fix it.

Cllr. Dowson advised that she had listened to a recent meeting of the Western Planning Committee. They were not content with the re-submitted proposals made Newitt Homes particularly with regard to the status of the maisonettes and the proposed drainage system detailed on the site plan. She suggested that Cllr. Leo Hammond be approached again regarding a site visit. The Clerk will contact Cllr. Hammond.

Cllr. Marsh raised the issue of Planning Applications and stated that every application should include an expiry date by which the work should commence. He also raised the issue of lorries on Sands Lane when planning for this site has now expired. He will raise these issues when he takes part in the Planning Briefing taking place on Zoom on 22nd June 2022.

9. CLERKS UPDATE/CORRESPONDANCE

The Clerk advised that work was ongoing with regard to the Cemetery records. Christine Wiles was now confirming contact details for Next of Kin.

The Clerk reminded Councillors about the Code of Conduct training which was taking place on Wed 22 Jun at 7.00pm via Zoom.

YOUR HOME – KEEP IT SAFE. FROM HOWDENSHERE POLICE

Burglary is by and large an opportunistic crime, with burglars looking for a home that gives them the easiest way of committing their crime undetected and with the fewest obstacles to negotiate. In many cases burglars do not need to use any force to gain entry which can be achieved via an insecure window or door. So how can you keep your home and property safe?

- **Going on Holiday**

If you are going away remember to cancel the milk or newspapers.

Don't make it obvious to burglars you are away; leave your curtains or blinds open – nothing reveals that a house is unoccupied so much as curtains drawn during the day. If possible, ask a trusted neighbour to close your curtains in the evening.

If you don't already have any, then consider getting timer switches and setting your lights both downstairs and upstairs to come on at different times throughout the day/evening.

Again, a trusted neighbour collecting your post and possibly parking their car on your drive, whilst you are away will add to your security.

Don't talk about your planned holiday on social media – you don't know who may be reading your comments or who they might tell.

Keep your valuables safe, out of sight and don't leave them where they can be seen through a window. If you conceal valuables in your home, avoid obvious hiding places such as your sock drawer or in a fake food can in the kitchen – burglars are wise to this trick.

Given that most burglars are opportunists, and their motive is generally to get in, get something of value and then get out as fast as possible, your intruder might be encouraged to leave after finding a fake hoard rather than turning your house upside down to find anything of real value

- **Security around the home**

Make your home looks occupied by leaving a radio on or a light on a timer switch to make the house sound and look as if someone is at home, even if you are out.

Never leave your spare keys in a hiding place such as under a doormat, in a flowerpot or inside a letterbox.

Make sure you use a burglar alarm (if you have one) every time you leave the house. Don't leave valuables on view or on windowsills and keep your car keys hidden out of sight - consider taking them up to bed with you at night. If you conceal valuables in your home, avoid obvious hiding places such as your sock drawer or in the bottom of a wardrobe.

If your property is stolen make sure you can describe it to the Police by keeping a record and photographs of makes, models and unique serial numbers etc. You can also register all your details onto WWW.immobilise.com. This is a web-based property records system, endorsed and searchable by all UK Police Forces and secondhand dealers.

- **Security in the garden**

Security of gardens and outbuilding buildings is often not your first thought. However, by making a few modifications sheds and garages, along with the equipment stored in them can be made more secure:

Make sure sheds and garages have good quality lock and hinges.

Consider fitting deterrents in the garden like movement sensitive floodlights as these will leave thieves feeling exposed. Likewise alarms on sheds and garages will deter thieves as they would not want to be spotted in out buildings taking property.

Garden tools, DIY equipment and leisure items such as fishing, and golf equipment should be locked away in storage cupboards within outbuildings to form a second line of defence to thieves.

Motorbike and pedal cycles should also be locked even when they are in a shed or garage.

As well as protecting property in sheds and garages people can also stop thieves stealing plants by using heavy plant pots which will be less desirable to walk off with and ensure that unused garden furniture and tools are stored securely out of sight.

Your Car is it set for the winter?

Make sure you check your lights before you set out in case a bulb has blown. (You might even consider carrying a spare light bulb or two)

Make sure your window washer is full of water and screen wash and that there is anti-freeze in your radiator.

Check the tyres. Have they got a decent amount of tread on them and are they at the correct pressure? If in doubt, get them checked.

Are your registration plates and car lights clean or do they need a wash?

Think about what you might need if you break down in the cold. Is there a blanket or a torch in the car? Consider having a mobile phone with you too.

Do not leave any valuables in your car e.g., a satnav or dash cam (remember to remove the cradle and any lasting sucker marks on the windscreen)

Never leave your keys in the ignition: a prime example is when paying for petrol or warming your car on an icy morning.

When leaving your vehicle parked, consider that although it might be still be daylight, think about nighttime lighting and how remote the location may become. Busy, overlooked or CCTV-monitored parking areas are far safer than deserted side streets

Any resident can use the ERYC online LINK to report a pothole or issues with roads, footpaths or kerbs, private road adoption, road resurfacing issues and schedules.

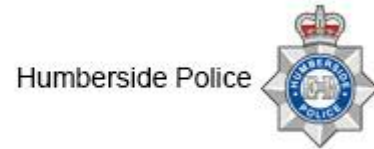

Keep hare coursers out of our countryside

Hare coursing is reducing year on year in our area because of action taken by the police and the close working relationship with our rural communities.

Sergeant Jenna Jones from our Rural Task Force said, "The good weather has brought the harvest forward and many of the crops have been brought in, leaving stubble fields with little protection for our brown hares.

"This is now the time of year where we see visiting criminals come to our area to hunt hares with dogs, a barbaric 'sport' known as hare coursing.

"We have done really well together to reduce hare coursing and I don't want that to stop.

"We are one of the 32 forces across the country that supports 'Operation Galileo' which aims to deter and prevent rural crime specifically hare coursing.

"Together we are able to co-ordinate our approach to tackling hare coursing and share information and intelligence to target offenders who cause the greatest harm to our rural communities.

"Prevention continues to be our continued focus of Op Galileo, supported by more sophisticated prosecutions and intelligence gathering capabilities.

"As the harvest is now almost completed, we want to remind our communities to report anyone who they suspect is hare coursing in our countryside.

"We have been out across the Force area in recent weeks carrying out patrols to prevent and deter criminals from coming into our area.

"Hare coursers often use old 4x4s and carry lurcher-type dogs in their vehicles. If you see any vehicle being driven in a suspicious way in our countryside, please call us and report your concerns.

"We have also seen a number of recent reports of illegal lamping in the area and this too is a wildlife crime we want to bring an end to.

"Poaching is a national wildlife crime priority and illegal 'lampers' are often involved in other criminality such as burglary and vehicle crime.

"We want you to report any suspicious activity to us, particularly in the early hours of the morning if you suspect lamping is in progress. By letting us know as it is happening, we can catch offenders in the act.

"Prevention measures should be considered by landowners such as preventing easy access by vehicles to land by using obstacles, gates and other barriers. This is one of the most effective measures that can be taken to frustrate and deter these criminals."

Please call 101 to report any suspicious activity – if you call us, we will act.
