NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Holme on Spalding Moor Parish Council has signed up the village into the Neighbourhood Watch (NHW) scheme. They would like all, or as many as possible, of the residents to get involved but before we spend too much money and time investigating this we need to know how much interest there is. It is free to join but without support it may not go ahead in the way that the PC would like.

Good neighbours are not 'spies or curtain twitchers' they are trying to help your neighbourhood to be safe by looking out for things that are unusual and out of place. They are also a benefit to older people who may need a bit of help from time to time.

Other benefits are reduce the risk of being burgled; free crime prevention advice; updates of issues reported to the local police; help to cut anti social behaviour, etc.

Around the country the existence of NHW has proven that it DOES reduce the activities listed above.

There are already one or two NHW schemes in existence in HOSM but the parish council would like to extend these groups to cover a wider area of our village. Please help us to get the village involved – **we can't do it without you**. On the back page of Grapevine there is a small questionnaire that we would like you complete please.

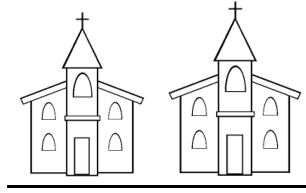

DOG POO – WHAT CAN HAPPEN IF YOU DON'T CLEAN UP

SADLY THE VAST IMPROVEMENT IN CLEARING UP AFTER YOU'RE DOG HAS GONE INTO REVERSE – SO THIS MESSAGE IS REPEATED

Dog 'poo' can be picked up on pram wheels, children's shoes, hands, etc and this can be transferred to children's mouths very easily. Do you know what the consequences could be?

Campylobacteriosis symptoms include diarrhoea, cramping, abdominal pain, and fever. The illness typically lasts one week but for people with compromised immune systems, Campylobacter can spread to the bloodstream and **result in a life-threatening infection.**

E. coli and other faecal coli form live in the intestines of many animals. Certain strains can escape into the bloodstream, or cause stomach cramps, nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, and fever. For people with weakened immune systems, **E.coli infection can result in death.**

Salmonellosis is the most common bacterial infection transmitted to humans by other animals. Symptoms include fever, muscle aches, headache, vomiting, and diarrhoea.

Yersiniosis is another bacterial disease that can cause intestinal infections in people. Yersinia can multiply in cold water, unlike many other bacteria and may be found in elevated numbers in ponds, puddles and lakes as they thaw in the spring.

Toxocariasis is an illness found in humans that occurs when they are infected with parasitic roundworms, originating from either the fecal matter of dogs and foxes (*Toxocara canis*), or cats (*Toxocara cati*). Although most people might display symptoms similar to the flu, there are certain instances, where the illness can turn into a more severe form known as Ocular Toxocariasis that has the **potential to cause blindness**

The above can be fatal in certain conditions therefore please, please clean up after your dog. You could face a fine of £1,000 if you are caught

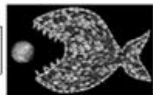

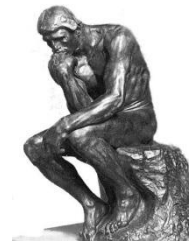

Just a Thought



Chafer grubs, part four and, hopefully, this will be my last report on these little pests! I first wrote about them in the summer of 2017 when my back garden, along with many areas of the village, was found to be infested with them. The first sign was when patches of lawn appeared to be dying off. We soon found out that the grass roots were being eaten by the larvae of the cock chafer beetle. We were not the only creatures to make this discovery as that part of the lawn was invaded by birds eager to dig up the grass and get at these tasty morsels. Blackbirds and pigeons were the chief excavators but they were soon followed by the squirrels. That part of the lawn was a mess. However, in the autumn, things settled down and I was able to reseed the patches and all seemed well.

Things took a turn for the worst in 2018 when a different patch of back lawn started being drilled into by the local bird population plus the squirrels. This time, the birds brought along their new brood and, at one point, I counted seven blackbirds tucking in to a feast on my lawn. We had experts come to suggest ways for us to be rid of the grubs but the most effective pesticide was now banned in the UK. Someone suggested that we use nematodes which we tried, carefully following instructions, but there was no improvement. Some friends also tried nematodes but with no success. One man said he was successful but had to treat the area ten times before getting results!

Then, the front lawn started showing the tell-tale signs of chafer grubs and, together with a long, hot summer, by September it was completely ruined. My front garden resembled a war zone. All we could do was to clear it completely and leave it as bare earth over the winter. I decided to try dousing it with a strong disinfectant used to clear paths, hoping to put paid to any remaining grubs. Then we had to decide what to do with the front garden, knowing that there was still a possibility of the return of the chafer grubs.

Our first thought was not to bother with a garden but to cover the ground with gravel or a brick paving. We have had experience with gravel in the past and decided to reject that idea. Eventually, weeds will grow through the under felt and gravel also tends to find its way into the house and along the paths. It becomes messy. We also rejected the idea of brick paving, even if it matched the front of the garage. It would look as if the whole of our frontage was a car park. So, we redesigned the front garden, putting in a tree and a foot path and making the flower border larger. We still have a lawn but it is smaller than the previous one. It looks so much better now and we are hoping and praying that we have had our fair share of the grubs. As I said, hopefully, I will never have to mention them again!

WARNING ABOUT SPIKED DRINKS FROM HUMBERSIDE POLICE

Drinkers heading out have been warned to stay extra vigilant after an increase in reports of drinks being spiked in the East Riding.

People in pubs across the county, including in Beverley and Kirk Ella, say they have been targeted.

Spiking drinks can have potentially devastating consequences and the recent hike in cases has led to Humberside Police issuing an urgent warning to drinkers to stay vigilant.

Instances have also been reported in Drifffield and Market Weighton, forcing the force to reiterate how people who are heading out for a good time can make sure they avoid becoming a victim.

The force has issued a community alert in a bid to potentially save people from serious harm.

It reads: "Drink spiking can happen in any situation. However, there are a few things you can do to protect yourself.

Get into the habit of never leaving your drink unattended and don't accept a drink from someone you don't know. Keep an eye on your drink at all times – don't go off and dance then come back and drink the rest.

Avoid drinking too much alcohol by sticking to the UK Chief Medical Officers' (CMO) low risk drinking guidelines of 14 units a week for both men and women.

This will put you in the best position to be alert to anything suspicious and able to look out for your friends."

WISE THOUGHTS BY TWO OF OUR YOUNGER MEMBERS OF OUR VILLAGE

This time of year while most of us are enjoying the lovely warm summer, it can potentially be fatal to some of our garden friends & pets.

Providing a shallow dish of water for all wildlife and food such as hedgehog food or dry complete cat/dog food can help hogs....especially during dry weather

Check areas thoroughly for hedgehogs & wildlife before strimming and mowing. Also watch out for garden netting (football nets too) as small animals can get caught up

Dispose of litter responsibly, every year many animals get caught up in discarded rubbish and die

Slug pellets and pesticides are harmful to hedgehogs and therefore damage their food chain

If you have a pond put in a stone or a ramp so small creatures can get out

If you find a young bird that looks a bit lost the chances are Mum is watching & feeding it. So keep an eye on it, but it's usually best to leave alone

Try and keep a tiny corner in your garden wild e.g. plant lavender, buddleia and alliums. Bees love these and it will attract butterflies and moths.

A small pond can be created by a simple washing up bowl, some pebbles and some pond weed (helps keep the water clean). You will be amazed how quickly it springs into lifeand the birds will love it too

AND remember....it's still too early to be cutting hedges. Some birds do have a second brood. So just let it grow wild!

YOUTH CLUB CHARTER

A new Youth Charter will be developed to set out a vision for young people over the next generation and beyond, Mims Davies, Minister for Sport and Civil Society announced today.

It follows a roundtable the Minister and Jeremy Wright, Secretary of State for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport, had with the youth sector, sports bodies, charities and creative organisations last week as part of the Prime Minister's Serious Youth Violence Summit to tackle knife crime.

The charter will reaffirm Government's commitment to give young people a strong voice on the issues they care about such as combating serious violence and knife crime, addressing mental and physical health challenges and concerns about the environment and climate change.

It will be developed over the coming months, with Government working alongside youth sector organisations and young people.

Mims Davies, Minister for Sport and Civil Society, said: "This is an important commitment to a generation for a generation. The Youth Charter will be a clear message to young people: we back them and are listening to them.

"We're determined to support young people in reaching their full potential. This charter will set out how."

Nadhim Zahawi, Children and Families Minister, said: "Every young person, whatever their background or the challenges they face, should have the chance to shape their own futures.

"We're working together to raise the bar in the opportunities available to the next generation and help improve their outcomes. The Youth Charter reaffirms young people's place at the heart of policy, making sure their voices are heard on important issues that affect them, from decisions about the environment, the schools they attend, support for mental health, or how we tackle serious violence."

The Minister for Sport and Civil Society will chair a roundtable with the sector to take this work forward.

The charter will build on the existing support and range of innovative projects currently supporting young people across the country. This includes £90 million from dormant bank accounts that is being used to help some of the most disadvantaged young people into employment.

The Government is also investing £80 million from Government and the National Lottery Community Fund in the Youth Investment and funds.

The Government has also pledged to renew specific youth work qualifications that were due to expire in 2020, subject to a business case, and review the youth work training curriculum.

It is hoped this will help address the recent decline in the number of people taking up youth work training and give youth workers the skills they need to best support young people.

Missed GP appointments in the East Riding of Yorkshire have already set the NHS back more than £500,000 this year, figures reveal.

Patients failed to attend 18,931 face-to-face consultations with doctors and nurses between January and April 2019, NHS Digital data shows.

The average cost for an appointment in England is £30, meaning no-shows in the East Riding of Yorkshire cost the NHS an estimated £567,930 over the four months – £4,733 a day.

The total so far this year is already enough to pay the annual salary of 25 full-time nurses.

And with sessions usually lasting around 10 minutes, unattended appointments meant GPs and other practice staff wasted 3,155 hours of consulting time, the equivalent of 19 weeks.

The Royal College of GPs said missed sessions are “a frustrating waste of resources” for GPs, and for other patients struggling to secure time with their doctors.

As of April this year, a total of 449,866 face-to-face consultations have been booked with GPs and other practice staff in the East Riding of Yorkshire Clinical Commissioning Group.

Of those, one in 24 was missed, without the patient calling in to cancel or reschedule.

Cancelled appointments are not included in the figures, as the surgery can offer those slots to other patients

Sneak Thieves

Now that spring / summer are here again, we all want to relax and enjoy the warmer weather; however we still need to think about home security to prevent ourselves from becoming victims of crime.

So what do you need to consider?

- You need to ensure that your home is always secure when you go out and that you don't leave potential entry points open and accessible, for example a downstairs window or a door. This also applies at night especially when it's a warm muggy evening and you are thinking about leaving a downstairs window open for ventilation whilst you are asleep.
- You may be out working in the garden and out of sight of the windows or doors that you have left open. You could even be cutting the grass or hedge perhaps with a loud lawn mower/hedge cutter or be using power tools and it could be so easy in these circumstances for a sneak thief to take advantage of the situation, go inside your home and steal things, for example keys, handbags, wallets, laptops etc that are often on display or easily accessible.
- The same applies with garages. We often leave the doors wide open and go off into the garden leaving everything in them on display. How easy is it then for someone to take advantage of this situation and steal bikes, power tools or garden equipment!
- Lastly there's your vehicles to consider: On a warm day, there might be a temptation to leave your car parked on the drive with its windows open to allow fresh air to circulate, along with items e.g. a sat nav, coat or shopping bags on clear view that you just haven't managed to bring in doors yet!. These items can all be stolen very quickly, but the worst case scenario is that your car could be stolen too.

The kinds of thefts described are committed by opportunists who could be wandering around your neighbourhood looking to take advantage of people who leave their property insecure **so think security at all times and don't become a victim of crime!**

SQUADRON 76 HOLME ON SPALDING MOOR

RAF Holme-on-Spalding Moor, or more simply **RAF Holme** as it was also known, was an airfield in Yorkshire. Built during the Second World War, it was used during the war by the Royal Air Force (RAF) as a bomber station, and after the war as a transport airfield and bomb store before being "mothballed". In the 1950s, the RAF used the station as a training camp before it was transferred to the United States Air Force (USAF) as a reserve station during the Cold War. After USAF use, it became a testing airfield for Blackburn Aircraft and its successor British Aerospace until 1983, when the airfield was closed. Many of the airfield buildings survive as an industrial estate, but most of the runways have been demolished.

There's one in stone to remember personnel of no 76 Squadron, who died in action

On Sunday 15th September at 11-15am there will be a remembrance service at the airfield and there will be a chance to meet some of the remaining airmen

How do I opt out of receiving any leaflets or unaddressed promotional material?

We (Post Office) are legally obliged to deliver all addressed mail, which includes mail that is addressed "To the Occupier" (or with any other generic recipient information), as well as mail that is personally addressed to you by name.

Opting out from Royal Mail Door to Door stops all **unaddressed items** from being delivered by us (although we do work with Government to get a message to every UK address in exceptional circumstances where delivery of the message is deemed to be in the national interest).

Things you need to know before choosing to 'opt out':

- It is not possible for us to separate material you don't want from those you do want. For example: advertising offers or leaflets from material from Central and Local Government and other public bodies.
- Opting out means no one at your address will receive unaddressed mail items.
- We deliver a minority of the total volume of unaddressed mail items in the United Kingdom. Our opt out does not cover any other distributors, who will continue to deliver unaddressed mail items to your property. Opting out of Royal Mail Door to Door deliveries will not necessarily reduce by a significant amount the number of items you'll receive.

If you still wish to opt out of receiving Door to Door mail items please print a copy of our Opt out form. Complete and sign it, then send it to the address shown on the form.

At the end of the two year period, in order to continue with your opt out, you will simply need to repeat this process and complete a new application form to confirm that you are still resident at the address and wish to continue opting out of Door to Door deliveries.

SHED AND GARDEN SECURITY – ADVICE FROM HUMBERSIDE POLICE

A lighter night often means criminals are on the prowl for easy pickings from gardens, sheds and garages. As the weather starts to warm up, we all spend more time outside, but we all also get a bit lax about leaving our property around and locking our sheds and garages when we use them.

Opportunist criminals are always on the lookout for bikes, tools, sports equipment and fishing tackle in sheds and garages, as well as in gardens.

So if you haven't assessed your security for some time then we would urge you to look at your sheds, garages and outbuildings and see how secure they really are. Do you need a better lock, an alarm, lighting, or even CCTC? Below are some areas to consider:

- Make sure your shed or garage is secured with a good quality lock.
- Keep back gates locked when not used.
- Check there are no bins, composters or trees that can be used for climbing over your garden fence to gain access – consider planting thorny bushes inside the fence to deter entry.
- Do you have security/motion sensor lights? They can be a great deterrent if your home or garden is secluded from street lighting.
- Loop a strong chain through the handles of your garden tools and connect the ends with a strong padlock. If possible, fix a large metal eyelet to part of the shed frame and loop the chain through it. Alternatively consider installing a lockable storage cupboard within your shed/garage to store valuable items in, as this will also form a second line of defence to thieves.
- As well as protecting property in sheds and garages people can also stop thieves stealing plants by using heavy plant pots which will be less desirable to walk off with.
- Many shed windows are never used, if this is the case – why not screw them shut. Fitting mesh or steel bars across the window from the inside allows light to enter but means the thief has to go to a lot of trouble to remove them. Replace broken glass with laminated glass.
- If you have a household alarms consider extending it to cover your outbuildings or fit a bespoke shed/garage alarm.
- Check your home contents policy to see if you are covered in the event of a break-in.
- If you have an expensive bicycle or motorbike, make sure you have a good quality lock securing it when it is not being used.
- For reference record a description and add photographs of your cycles, golf clubs, fishing equipment, tools and any other valuable property free on www.immobilise.com.
- Consider marking your property too using a visible permanent marker (e.g. waterproof paint, engraving or permanent marker pen) or if you prefer an invisible marker (UV pens etc). It is recommended that you put your postcode prefixed with the number of your address; this allows any recovered stolen goods to be identified and returned to the owner.
- Never leave ladders in your back garden – they could be stolen and used in house burglaries.
