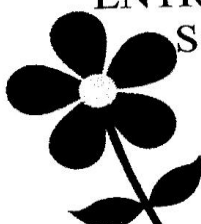

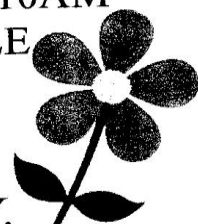

Again, bad parking is still an issue in the village. The last Grapevine included an article about cars parking close to being adjacent to each other which means emergency vehicles cannot get by. Please, please be considerate you may save a life. **Blocking pavements with vehicles also causes problems for people with push chairs, older people and mobility scooters.** (See page 24)

One major thing came out of this is that people do not always report problems because 'no one will do anything anyway' A thought for you, may be the authorities do not do anything because they think the issues are minor because very few people actually report a problem. TV LICENCE FRAUD

An ongoing TV Licensing phishing campaign, first identified by the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) in September 2018, continues to be reported to Action Fraud in high numbers. Fraudsters are sending the public fake TV Licensing emails that are designed to steal their personal and financial information. Since April 2018, Action Fraud has received over 900 crime reports with victim losses totalling more than £830,000.

How you can protect yourself:

Don't click on the links or attachments in suspicious emails and never respond to messages that ask for your personal or financial details.

- Don't assume a phone call or email is authentic, even if someone knows your basic details (such as your name or address). Remember, criminals can spoof phone numbers and email addresses to appear as companies you know and trust, such as TV Licensing.
- Your bank will never call and ask you for your PIN, full banking password, or ask you to transfer money out of your account.

What to do if you've fallen victim:

- Let your bank know as soon as possible and monitor your bank statements regularly for any unusual activity.
- If you suspect your identity may have been stolen you can check your credit file quickly and easily online. Use a reputable service provider and follow up on any unexpected or suspicious results.
- If you have been a victim of fraud or cyber crime, report it to Action Fraud at [actionfraud.police.uk](https://www.actionfraud.police.uk), or by calling 0300 123 2040.

PEOPLES LOTTERY FRAUD

Police have warned about a new scam doing the rounds. If you receive a letter from The People's Postcode Lottery, stating that you have won a large sum of money, please do not give your bank details or personal to them. Check with the official organising company before you proceed.

Extra to this a fall pipe has been ripped off the new extension to the Pavilion and at the same time some fall pipes and drain pipes off the Beacon View garages had been ripped off and thrown over the Playing Field, on top of this damage has been done to the gym equipment and not so long ago the fire service was called out to our Play Area. The police are aware of all this.

On the playing front our Senior 1st team have secured enough points to ensure they will be competing in the Hull and East Riding County Premier League next season also they had good cup runs in getting to a quarter final and a semi-final. As to the 2nd team it has been a very difficult season for them as players from the first and second team throughout the season have been unavailable for whatever reason but credit must go to Jonny Foster who has by whatever means managed to field a team and so fulfil its fixture list. Talking of Jonny Foster, he has decided to step down so I would like to take this opportunity in thanking him for all the work he has done not just for this season but for the many seasons he has been with Holme Rovers and deserves a well-earned rest.

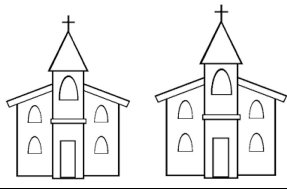

EAST RIDING OF YORKSHIRE COUNCIL – SAFE AND SOUND GRANT

This grant is for home owners and private tenants

What is this grant? The grant is to help minimise the fear of crime by providing additional home security measures to enable residents to feel safer in their homes.

Who is eligible for help? To qualify for assistance applicants must be:-

- Aged over 60 or disabled
- A homeowner or private sector tenant / Housing Association tenant

Applicants must not have a combined household capital / savings of more than £23,250. This excludes the property you live in, fixtures and fittings within the property and any vehicles you own.

Further grants will not be made to anyone receiving support from the Safe and Sound grant scheme in the last 2 years.

How can you help me? We can arrange for a qualified contractor to carry out a free home security assessment and fit home security equipment.

What additional home security measures are available to me? Measures include but are not limited to*:-

- Additional locks for doors and windows
- Door chains
- Door viewers
- Window alarms

*Some types of locks and security measures can only be fitted depending on the type of existing windows and doors.

CHINESE LANTERNS – TAKE CARE

We are approaching the seasons when a lot of celebrations take place and the following appeared in the press recently

Though Chinese Lanterns are Legal, it is important to take care using them and be aware of the potential risks. In order to use one you must follow certain rules, of which some are:-

- Do not launch under the influence of alcohol
- Do not use in built up areas or within 5 miles of an airfield or coast where they could be interpreted as a distress signal
- Do not launch if any part of the lantern is damaged
- Lanterns are not toys and should not be used by anyone under the age of 16

Remember lanterns can cause distress to farm animals and wild birds and animals.

Additionally, lanterns are a BIG fire hazard and can easily set fire to a field of corn, wheat, etc – especially during the summer.

ANTI SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

On Saturday 27th April your editor attended a Neighbour Hood Watch conference at Beverley – the topic was anti social behaviour. Over the next few issues of Grapevine I will continue include articles that I receive that hopefully will help resolve any issues or give you information on how to report it.

Key points about Anti Social Behaviour issues:-

- **Report it**
- **We don't know unless you tell us, so report it**
- **Are you having persistent problems with your neighbours?**
- **Do you feel intimidated and threatened?**
- **Have you suffered verbal abuse or threats?**
- **Have you seen rowdy and intimidating behaviour?**
- **Harassment**
- **Damage to property**
- **Vandalism**

If so East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Anti Social Behaviour team could help.

If you are a victim of Anti Social Behaviour report it to the team by calling 01482 396380

For Police non emergencies report it to Humberside Police by calling 101

If there is a crime in progress or in an emergency call 999

This year the club would like to extend an Open Invitation for a FREE TRIAL to anyone, who would like to give bowls a try.

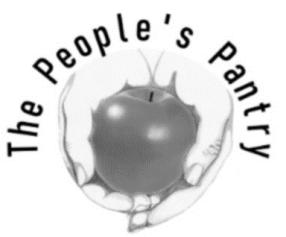

'Make Yourself Heard' awareness from Humberside Police

Police are raising awareness of a service that enables people to contact them in an emergency where the caller is too scared to make a noise or speak on the phone.

The Independent Office for Police Conduct has launched a campaign called 'Make Yourself Heard' to make people aware of the silent solution system.

After calling 999, if making a sound would put the caller or someone else in danger and the BT operator cannot decide whether an emergency service is needed, the call will be transferred to the silent solution system.

But police will not automatically attend if you make a **silent 999 call**. Callers need to listen and respond to questions and instructions, including by coughing or tapping the handset if possible, or if using a mobile phone, once prompted by the automated silent solution system, pressing 55.

Today we launch our #MakeYourselfHeard campaign, with support from @womensaid and @policechiefs, to raise awareness of the #SilentSolution system and how to get police help when you're too scared to speak. You can download the guide here

How does the silent system work?

Callers will hear an automated police message, which lasts for 20 seconds and begins with 'you are through to the police'. It will ask you to press 55 to be put through to police call management. The BT operator will remain on the line and listen.

If you press 55, they will be notified and transfer the call to the police. If you don't press 55, the call will be terminated.

When transferred to your local police force the police call handler will attempt to communicate with you by asking simple yes or no questions. If the caller is not able to speak, then they must listen carefully to the questions and instructions from the call handler so that they can assess the call and arrange help if it is needed.

Vehicle Security

Unfortunately theft from cars and vans is quite a common crime. In some cases vehicles are stolen as a result of a "2 in 1 burglary". This term is used when there are two offences in one, for example when vehicle keys have been stolen in order for offenders to take a car from outside a property. (These crimes have usually been committed overnight and often the offenders have gained access to a house by forcing entry).

Below are some simple security measures that can be taken to help protect you and your livelihood.

- Keep your car keys safe and out of sight, don't leave them near an open window and if you are work, then ensure that you keep your keys with you at all times (don't leave them in your vehicle/van).
- Never hang your keys near to doors where they could be taken through a letterbox.
- Never leave your house or car keys in an obvious place like a handbag or key cupboard.
- If you've got a garage, use it and lock it!
- Always keep your vehicle's windows closed and the car locked at all times.
- If your car/van doesn't have an alarm/immobilizer then consider getting one fitted.
- Consider extra security such as a steering wheel lock. (Steering locks and gear level locks are often all that is needed to deter a thief as they simply don't want the hassle of breaking in and trying to get them undone.)
- Never leave any property or personal documentation in your car or van on display, i.e. on car seats, in the foot wells or half hidden under a seat as it only takes criminals seconds to smash a window and grab something.
- If you use a satnav or a dash camera, make sure you not only remove the device from view but also its cradle and don't forget to wipe away any telltale sucker marks on the windscreen too.
- If you own a van and are able to so, then make sure that all stock and tools are removed overnight, consider parking it so that the rear and side doors are tight to walls, garage doors or other vehicles to hinder direct access and any physical attacks.
- Security mark all your tools and equipment to make items uniquely identifiable and less attractive to a thief. You can also register them on www.immobilise.com so that if they were ever stolen and then recovered at a later date they can easily be traced back to their owner.

Please note the scam report below and the advice from one of our local Chartered Accountants- sent to me by one of our Neighbourhood Watch groups.

Warning from East Riding NHW Group:

"I have just experienced a most frightening and upsetting call on my mobile from 0300 200 2176. The man warned me initially that the call was being recorded as evidence of a criminal case against me for tax evasion in respect of an outstanding sum of £1850. He stated his name was Matthew Smith reference 98560LR and my case number was 892241761. They had sent previous recorded letters to me which I had ignored and they had proof that these letters were delivered and ignored by myself. I was to be allowed two options firstly pay the sum in full today or let the police come and arrest me by warrant and seize all my assets and freeze my bank accounts. It would then have me black listed for life. When I asked for proof of the debt he said I should look into my computer and look up an internet address he would give me and it would show me all the information I required. I was more suspicious this time as I thought he could hack into my computer so I said I was unable to do this while on my mobile with him, so he said he would send the police round with a warrant this afternoon and hung up. I was left shaking like a leaf and my youngest sister checked the number and it was a HMRC scam telephone number. He was very convincing and the vulnerable could be taken in by him. "

Advice from a local Chartered Accountant: "Clients regularly receive spam HMRC emails - they look real but usually do not give the taxpayer's name, just "sir" or "customer" although there are other clues - is it good English and does it read as an official letter should. If in any doubt, forward it to the anti-fraud section at HMRC on"

LITTER FINES INCREASED

New larger fines have been introduced as part of continuing action by East Riding of Yorkshire Council to tackle littering and fly-tipping in the East Riding. From now on, anyone caught littering will be at risk of receiving a £150 fixed penalty from the council – double the previous fine. A new larger £150 penalty also applies to anyone caught fly-posting – the illegal act of putting up signs on the public highway without the council's permission. However, people guilty of the offences can receive much larger fines if the cases are taken to court. The changes are part of ongoing action by the council's street scene enforcement team, which is tasked with investigating all incidents of littering, fly-posting and fly-tipping in the East Riding. Officers respond to reports from the public and regularly visit sites known to be used by fly-tippers. Any evidence they find will be used to bring a prosecution. It costs the council around £350,000 each year to clear up incidents of fly-tipping and littering in the East Riding. Residents are encouraged to report any incidents fly-tipping, littering and fly-posting to the council. Anyone who finds dumped rubbish, who witnesses fly-tipping taking place or sees any suspicious activity, can report it by calling 01482 393939.

505 knives and weapons have been handed into the knife bins during #OpSceptre

Recently Humberside Police took part in the national knife surrender campaign #OpSceptre bins were placed in police stations across the force and people had the opportunity to hand in any weapon they wanted to.

Hull's Inspector Matthew Wilson was present when the bins were unlocked and the contents revealed; "There are some very serious weapons here that will now be destroyed and will never get into the hands of anyone who intends to do harm.

"There is a mixed bag of weapons in the bins and some are souvenir swords which although are not the usual lethal weapon if the owners want to get rid of them then I am happy they've handed them in rather than them getting into the hands of anyone else who could use them to commit crime.

"Some bins got a lot more knives handed in than others with the main areas being Hull and Grimsby. I want to thank everyone who took the time to come to hand in these weapons"

Although this campaign has ended if anyone wants to hand a knife or weapon in you can call 101 to arrange for them to be handed in.

We continue our #NoMoreKnives campaign and are visiting every Secondary school in the Force area to give a presentation and talk to students about the dangers of carrying knives.

A campaign encouraging drivers in the East Riding not to block pedestrian crossings when they park has now come to an end.

Up to March civil enforcement officers from East Riding of Yorkshire Council have given out warning notices, instead of fixed penalty notices, to motorists parked across dropped kerbs.

The campaign was launched to raise awareness of the issue after officers reported a growing number of parked cars causing obstructions.

Blocking crossings can cause serious problems for wheelchair users, mobility scooter riders, parents with prams and pushchairs, people with sight problems and elderly pedestrians needing to cross the road.

A total of 51 warning notices were issued by officers during the four-week campaign and many more drivers were spoken to about the initiative.

Now the campaign has come to an end, officers will return to issuing £70 fixed penalty notices where they find a vehicle is causing an obstruction by parking across a dropped kerb.

Paul Tripp, head of street scene services at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said:

"We have had a very positive response from the public to our campaign.

Our officers have spoken to many drivers to explain about the campaign and they have all responded in a positive manner when asked to move on, and that has been much appreciated.

We've also had numerous requests for help from residents asking us to monitor certain streets and areas outside schools where parking on crossings is an issue.

So our campaign has definitely raised awareness of the problem, but we will continue to encourage drivers to be more considerate when they park."

HOUSING DEVELOPMENT – PUBLIC MEETING 8TH MAY 2019

The meeting was chaired by our Ward Cllr Victoria Aitken. Ward Cllr Nigel Wilkinson, most of the Parish Council and approximately 100 people attended. James Chatfield, East Riding of Yorkshire planning officer, explained about the current East Riding Council housing plan for the next few years, which meets with the government housing requirements across ALL of East Yorkshire. Mr. Chatfield also explained and the difference between approved and 'non approved' building areas within the HOSM parish.

The meeting then focused on two Outline Planning Applications that have been submitted in locations that are outside the approved Local Plan for development of HOSM: 175 houses on Back Lane (planning no 19/00748/STOUT) and 42 houses on Selby Road / Station Lane junction (planning no. 19/01126/OUT. To date (15/05/2019) **No** planning application has been made, at this stage it is only “outline planning” that has been submitted, your parish council **do not support** these.

Residents engaged in long discussions about local infrastructure and whether the village could cope with extra traffic, the surgery, school numbers, etc. It is acknowledged that Holme does need to grow and develop but at a rate which allows the infrastructure and services to develop as well without detriment to the character of the village.

What can you do? You are encouraged to write to the ERYC with your comments about these applications. There are a number of ways you can do this:

- Via their web site **www.eastriding.gov.uk**, search “Planning applications” and enter the above reference numbers. You can then submit your comments directly onto the website
- Email **planning@eastriding.gov.uk**, again quote the above numbers.
- Write to **Planning Dept., ERYC, Beverley, HU17 9BA.**

You are advised to **email or post separate letters for each application** so they are counted individually. Family members can write or email, but again ensure they’re sent to the ERYC **separately!** To help we’ve attached two blank letterheads on pages 37 and 39 of Grapevine to assist you. All you need to do is detach and write your comments on the sheet and send off! – Note there are 2 blank pages, being the reverse of the letters, so that you can use the letters direct from Grapevine.

Whilst dates for both applications to be heard by Planning Committee have yet to be confirmed you are advised to submit your comments as soon as possible. For the Gladman application by 7th June at the latest is recommended.

One comment was made at the meeting that *“These companies planning developments have a lot money and will keep on appealing time and time again hoping that residents will get fed up and give up”* **To save our village we must never give up so please submit your comments now!**
