The **River Foulness** is a river in the East Riding of Yorkshire, England. Its name is derived from Old English meaning “dirty water”.^[1] Maintenance responsibilities for the river transferred from the Environment Agency to the Market Weighton Drainage Board on 1 October 2011. Market Weighton Drainage Board subsequently amalgamated with the Lower Ouse Internal Drainage Board on 1 April 2012 to create the Ouse and Humber Drainage Board.^[2] The river discharges into the Humber Estuary via Market Weighton Canal. Water levels within the river, its tributaries and the canal are managed and controlled by the Environment Agency.^[3] The river lies in an area known as the Humberhead Levels. The river rises in the fields north-west of the village of Shiptonthorpe which is close to the town of Market Weighton. It flows south through the village and then heads west south-west towards Holme-on-Spalding-Moor. Circumnavigating the town, the river then turns back in a south-easterly direction until it joins the Market Weighton Canal just north of the M62. (Wikipedia)

PERSONAL HISTORY – He was born at Sandhill Farm 1st November 1929 where he grew up and farmed all his working life. He is now retired and enjoys seeing his son and grandson farm the farm.

The Smith family moved to HOSM from Melbourne in 1785.

The Smith family moved to Sandhill Farm in October 1871 150 years this year.

He has been married to Sheila (nee Stewart) for 65 years.

PARISH COUNCIL – he was elected to the Parish Council May 1971, and has served without a break ever since. During this time he served as Vice Chairman for approximately 10 years and as Chairman for approximately 13 years. Some of his achievements included the organisation of the village celebration for Queen’s Silver Jubilee when vice chair and when he was Chairman he negotiated and completed purchase of land for new Village Cemetery. He is still a member of HOSM Parish Council.

SCHOOL GOVERNORS – he served in this role for many years.

VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE – he served on this Committee for about 40 years including chairing the group that organised Village Celebration Concert to celebrate the Village Hall Anniversary. He still attends meetings as an Honorary Life Member.

HOLME FEAST CHILDREN’S SPORTS COMMITTEE – He served on this committee for over 20 years most of the time as Chairman. He helped raise funds for the annual Fete Sports and Tea each September.

HOLME PLAYING FIELDS ASSOCIATION - For several years he organised the Village Knockout Day Competition for this committees funds. It was transferred to the Scouts for their fund raising day.

BADMINTON CLUB – he was a founder member of Holme Badminton Club and played regularly until age took over and he had to retire.

HOLME & DISTRICT FARMERS DISCUSSION GROUP – he has been a member of this group for over 60 years after leaving Holme Young Farmers Club where he had served as Chairman. He was Chairman of Discussion Group for 43 years. His son, Richard, is also a member and is now Chairman.

HOLME EDUCATION AND IN NEED CHARITY - he has served as a trustee of this committee for 48 years and is still a Trustee. He also represents this committee on Sir Marmaduke Charity at Market Weighton.

HOLME SELBY ROAD METHODIST CHURCH – he has been a member of the Chapel since childhood being part of 4th generation of his family to belong to this Chapel. He was a Sunday school teacher for a number of years. He was church Treasurer for 42 years until he retired. After approximately 50 years he is still Senior Church Steward. He has also served as Church Steward for the Methodist Church Group, Market Weighton Methodist circuit for 16 years.

We at the shed are very grateful for these generous grants. New members from the village and surrounding villages will benefit from these grants over the coming years.

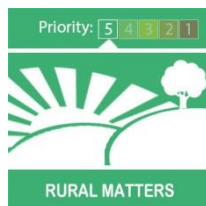

Night Hawking - Illegal Metal Detecting

Rural Task Force :-We have been receiving a number of calls in relation to Night Hawking (illegal metal detecting) on farm land and areas of archaeological interest.

The removal of any object from land without the landowner's permission is theft.

Further offences are also committed if damage is caused to protected archaeological sites, using metal detectors on archaeological sites without a licence from Historic England or failing to report objects found that are potential treasure under the Treasure Act.

Night Hawkers have complete disregard for the law and experts warn that we are losing priceless heritage of our nation.

If you witness anyone metal detecting on land or acting suspicious around protected archaeological sites, please contact police on 999 due to suspected crimes in action and 101 for non emergency incidents. 2310

NEW COMMUNITY BEAT MANAGER FOR OUR AREA

Market Weighton and Pocklington and the surrounding villages will now have a dedicated police Community Beat Manager.

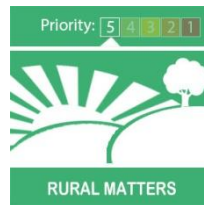
PC Abbi Davis will be based at Pocklington and will be helping the existing local policing team to tackle the issues of the area. Abbi will be dedicated to working with the local policing team to tackle any issues that have an impact on the community. This includes working with young people on early intervention and engagement with the primary and secondary schools.

She was asked about the current issues in the rural communities around Market Weighton and Pocklington. She said, "This is such a large rural community who are affected by not only the usual issues of burglary, theft, anti-social behaviour and low-level drug issues. This area has also got the additional issues of wildlife crime and vehicle crime. We now have our Rural Task Force based at Driffild who deal with wildlife, rural & heritage crime and so I am keen to work alongside them to tackle any issues affecting that side of the community. I am hoping to tackle the issues affecting this community by building on the already good relationships with our partner agencies. Giving the communities a voice and feeding back the problems. Promoting trust with our local communities by engagement from the local policing team.

I will be taking advantage of all the skills and specialism's held by Humberside Police and requesting resources where applicable such as specialist roles like roads policing, to tackle issues such and HGVs and speeding concerns in our rural villages. I will also look to gain the support of the Op Galaxy team for any potential warrants we need to conduct to tackle any local drug-based crime issues. The local residents have a big role to play in tackling local crime. I would ask for people to make sure they report any suspicious activity or crime to us so we can act on that information and target those areas of most concern in our community.

Abbi end by saying "I can't wait to get out and about and meet the local community and hope that when people see me they will to come and have a chat with me and let me know of any issues that they have."

Dogs Worrying Livestock

Rural Task Force

We have received a report from a landowner who had reason to speak to a dog walker due to his three dogs being off the lead & disturbing his sheep. Unfortunately the landowner was subjected to abuse from this dog walker when asked to put his dogs back on the lead.

It is an offence for your dog to worry livestock on agricultural land and as part of the Countryside Code whenever you take your dog into the outdoors you must ensure it does not disturb any wildlife, farm animals, horses or other people by keeping it under effective control.

This includes keeping your dog on a lead, in sight at all times and confident it will return to you promptly and ensuring it does not stray off the path or area you have right of access.

Please co-operate and respect the farmers at work in the countryside.

You may be liable to prosecution if livestock is attacked or chased by your dog not under close control.

Market Weighton Canal Trail – Update March 2021



Thanks to all of you for your continued support for this Community inspired project. The need for the Canal Trail has attained even more significance over the past year after being locked in our homes for us to look forward to exploring and enjoying our surrounding local countryside.

Almost 1 year ago we had submitted an application for funding to the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) when it was understandably withdrawn to enable focus on Covid related impacts that needed support. Whilst naturally disappointed we were very pleased that funding would be provided to those in greatest need. The Heritage Fund has now re-opened the application process with a revised focus on how our heritage assets can play a significant role in strengthening recovery post Covid. These priorities include:

- Making our communities a better place to live
- Creating economic prosperity
- Supporting personal wellbeing.

In preparation for an updated and re-focused application we now need your help in once again connecting with our residents and stakeholders. It is vitally important that we incorporate the views and aspirations of our community, be they residents, businesses or agencies that are supportive in our aim to create a coherent walking Trail along the route of the Canal. This will link with the Trans Pennine Trail at Humber Lock and at the northern end with the Hudson Way and other routes in Market Weighton.

We will shortly be in touch with all who have been interested in the Canal Trail Project to seek your support and input your aspirations to our application. Most importantly we are seeking the views of all residents as to how they would like to become involved in the Project through volunteering or simply providing their recollections relating to the history of the Canal. BEWARE OF CAR CRIME

Due to Covid-19 and repeated lockdowns, people haven't been using their cars as much as they used to. However, car crime remains a pressing problem in the UK – alarmingly, one car is stolen every ten minutes. The latest figures from the Police National Computer indicate car crime decreased during Covid-19 restrictions but with the expectation of social restrictions soon easing we could see a surge in car crime. We have launched a new campaign to encourage everyone to keep their car's safety top of mind. Shockingly 44% of cars are broken into through an unlocked door. 80% of car crime occurs during the evening or at night. We know that leaving valuables on display attracts car thieves. We are asking car owners to remember to LEAVE YOUR CAR: LOCKED, LIT AND EMPTY.

John Hayward-Cripps, CEO of Neighbourhood Watch Network, says "Most car crimes happen because cars are left unlocked. There is a misconception that some cars are auto-locking and lock themselves if left unattended after a period of time. This isn't always correct. Another misconception is that your car is too old and no one will bother stealing it. This is also incorrect – both new and old cars are at risk. Having a car stolen or broken into is more than simply a hassle; it can impact on people's livelihoods. The good news is that there are simple steps everyone can take to help reduce the risk to their car. With only a 46% recovery rate³ we're reminding everyone to leave your car locked, lit and empty." Leave your car:

1. Locked: A simple mistake that can prove calamitous: 44% of cars are broken into via an unlocked door. See our Leave Your Car Locked video.
2. Lit: 80% of car crime occurs during the evening or at night. Parking near streetlamps or in a busy area can deter thieves. See our Leave Your Car Lit video.
3. Empty (or with no items on show): Owners often forget that personal belongings are at as much risk of being stolen as the car itself. Leaving items on a car seat or forgetting to lock your car can act as an invitation for crime. We want to instil the habit of double checking where and how you've parked with our three simple steps: leave it locked, lit and empty. As a local charity with a trusted voice in the community, we're asking everyone to proactively support their neighbours and friends by sharing our three steps with three others. By spreading the word, we're confident we can crack down on car crime which can be deeply distressing and debilitating for its victims."

The vast majority of car crimes happen to unlocked cars, parked in badly lit areas and where there are visible items to steal. Remember these simple steps to keep your car safe... LEAVE IT LOCKED, LIT AND EMPTY.

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Update to service from 12 April

East Riding Libraries continue to offer an 'Order and Collect' service at the door for those customers who prefer to use it, and will also be open for limited browsing (maximum of 30 minutes, which may be reduced at the busiest times).

Customers wishing to browse will need to bring their library card in order to borrow items in a safe contactless way. (The library at East Riding Leisure Haltemprice will not be able to offer browsing, and Leven library will offer the Order and Collect service at the door only).

Public Access Computers from 19 April, available for essential use

From Monday, 19 April, public PC's will be available for essential use, and 30 minute slots will be available to [book here](#).

At this time, for everyone's safety, staff will not be able to provide assistance.

Computer facilities will not be available at Haltemprice or Leven, but as a library member you are welcome to use any [East Riding Library](#) (not just your local one).

Caddy liners will be available at the door. There will be a strict limit on the number of customers at all sites, so queuing is likely.

Customers are reminded that only single households / support bubbles will be allowed – mixed households will not be able to visit a site together.

Mobile Libraries will continue their usual service, and Short Stay routes will restart on Monday, 12 April.

Mobiles will continue to offer the Order and Collect service at the door, and limited browsing; one customer on the vehicle at any time.

Customers wishing to browse will need to bring their library card in order to borrow items in a safe way.

Caddy liners will be available at the door.

Public PC's will not be available on mobiles, because of the limited space.

Holme Helpers (HH) is a Holme-Upon-Spalding-Moor village volunteer group and the legacy from the COVID-19 group which was established to deal with the lockdown in March 2020 due to the Coronavirus. As of April 2021, HH has taken over completely and the COVID-19 group no longer exists. However, many of the personnel are the same people and many residents will not notice a difference.

The purpose of HH was to establish a volunteer group for the long term, not just whilst we all endure the ramifications of the COVID-19 virus. Its aims are:

- To deliver services that promote the reduction of isolation and loneliness to enable people to feel safe and supported in the Parish of Holme-Upon-Spalding-Moor
- To develop community events together
- To engage people of all ages in volunteering.

In practical terms, for the foreseeable future this will mean the following services:

- Going shopping for residents and delivering it to their doors
- Collecting and delivering prescriptions
- Providing the Holme-Upon-Spalding-Moor People's Pantry delivery service.

If you need to take advantage of these please call Holme Helpers on 07395 935907. Whilst this number is not manned 24 hours a day every day, please leave a message or wait for someone to call you back. Missed calls are regularly reviewed.

Looking further forward we will work together to agree upon clearly defined projects that will benefit the community as a whole and we are open to suggestions / ideas, although in the current circumstances with social distancing and other restrictions still in place it may only be possible to do these later in 2021.

We are always keen to hear from people who wish to join HH, either on the Committee, or as a Member, or as a volunteer, or even all three! The more the merrier so the workload can be spread and mean your commitment is not too onerous. You can give as much time as you would like.

The HH Committee

The Committee is made up of a number of people with the following occupying the Officers' roles for the current year (commencing 1 April 2021):

- Chair – Zaila Rhodes
- Treasurer – Jim Davie
- Secretary (temporary) – Judith Gardner

The rest of the Committee comprises up to six other people, although more can be co-opted for specific projects. None of the Committee received any financial reward or expenses for their work. All Committee members must also be Members of HH.

HH Members

Membership is open to anyone who:

- is aged over 18 years old; and
- lives in the Parish of Holme-Upon-Spalding-Moor; and
- supports the aims of HH.

There is no Membership Fee. As a Member you will be invited to General Meetings and be able to take part in discussions. You will also be allowed to vote as and when appropriate.

HH Volunteers

Being a volunteer is open to anyone who:

- is aged over 16 years old (or younger if supervised by an adult); and
- lives in Holme-Upon-Spalding-Moor or the surrounding area; and
- supports the aims of HH.

Easyfundraising



Apart from donations, using Easyfundraising.org.uk is a completely free way of raising money for HH when you shop online. Approximately 5,000 retailers (many of them household names) have signed up and donate money to us whenever you go through their site and pay for something online (subject to what they have agreed to!).

All you need to do is go to the Easyfundraising.org.uk site, create an account and select Holme Helpers as the cause you wish to support. Then, whenever you want to go shopping online, go through the Easyfundraising site first, select your retailer (you will click through to their site) and shop as normal. You don't have to log out, and any amount raised will automatically come to HH bank account directly once a quarter. It couldn't be simpler!

Even better, if you copy and paste the link below into your browser by 31 July 2021 it will automatically take you to their site and start you off and if you raise at least £5 in the first 12 months Easyfundraising will donate another £5 to HH. It will all add up!!

Minutes from Holme Helpers Committee Meeting held (by Zoom) on Thursday 25 February 2021

Present: Zaila Rhodes (Chair), Joy Higham, Kath Worsey, James Davie (Treasurer), Diane Hodder, Susan Wilson, Judith Gardner (Temporary Secretary).

- The constitution was discussed with Sarah Hartley from ERVAS. It was agreed to separate volunteers and members, adding a definition of members to cover anyone who would like to be included. Also, that there would be an annual requirement to check that memberships were still valid.
 - The following changes were also agreed:-
 - the committee will consist of between 3 and 9 members;
 - the passage beginning 'the meeting is open to any member who wishes.....' is to be put back into the constitution
 - remove 'HOSM and surrounding areas' and replace with 'Parish of HOSM...'
 - It was agreed that once the changes had been made, the constitution would be passed and Holme Helpers would then take over from the Covid-19 Group.
- Logos discussed and logo B agreed upon. ZR to go back to Emma and confirm.
- JG agreed to be temporary secretary. ZR proposed, KW seconded.
- It was agreed for Holme Helpers to be part of Parish Council Emergency plan. ZR to inform the Parish Council of this decision.
- JD informed the committee of the cash at bank position.

- Discussion of volunteer badges/cards. Several Committee members had the ability to produce laminated versions. It was agreed to revisit this when the constitution had been finalised.
- It was agreed there was a need to email current Covid-19 volunteers to ascertain whether they wish to be transferred to Holme Helpers. ZR to agree the wording of a suitable email with Sharon Smith, who maintains the Covid-19 database, for Sharon to forward to the Covid-19 volunteers.
- JH volunteered to provide online GDPR training for all the committee. All agreed and accepted. JH to provide Committee Members with log in details.

KW mentioned the possibility of Grapevine being printed again, and asked for volunteers to help delivering these if it went ahead. DH volunteered the Scouts, other volunteers were to be approached, and Holme Helpers Committee Members also agreed to assist.

- Next meeting Tuesday 23 March 5pm (Zoom). ZR to issue the invitation to Committee Members.
- It was agreed that we should post the Committee minutes on the village notice boards once they had been approved. ZR was to seek approval from the Parish Council to get their authority. JD / JG would take responsibility for posting them up. They could also be published in Grapevine and on the Parish website.

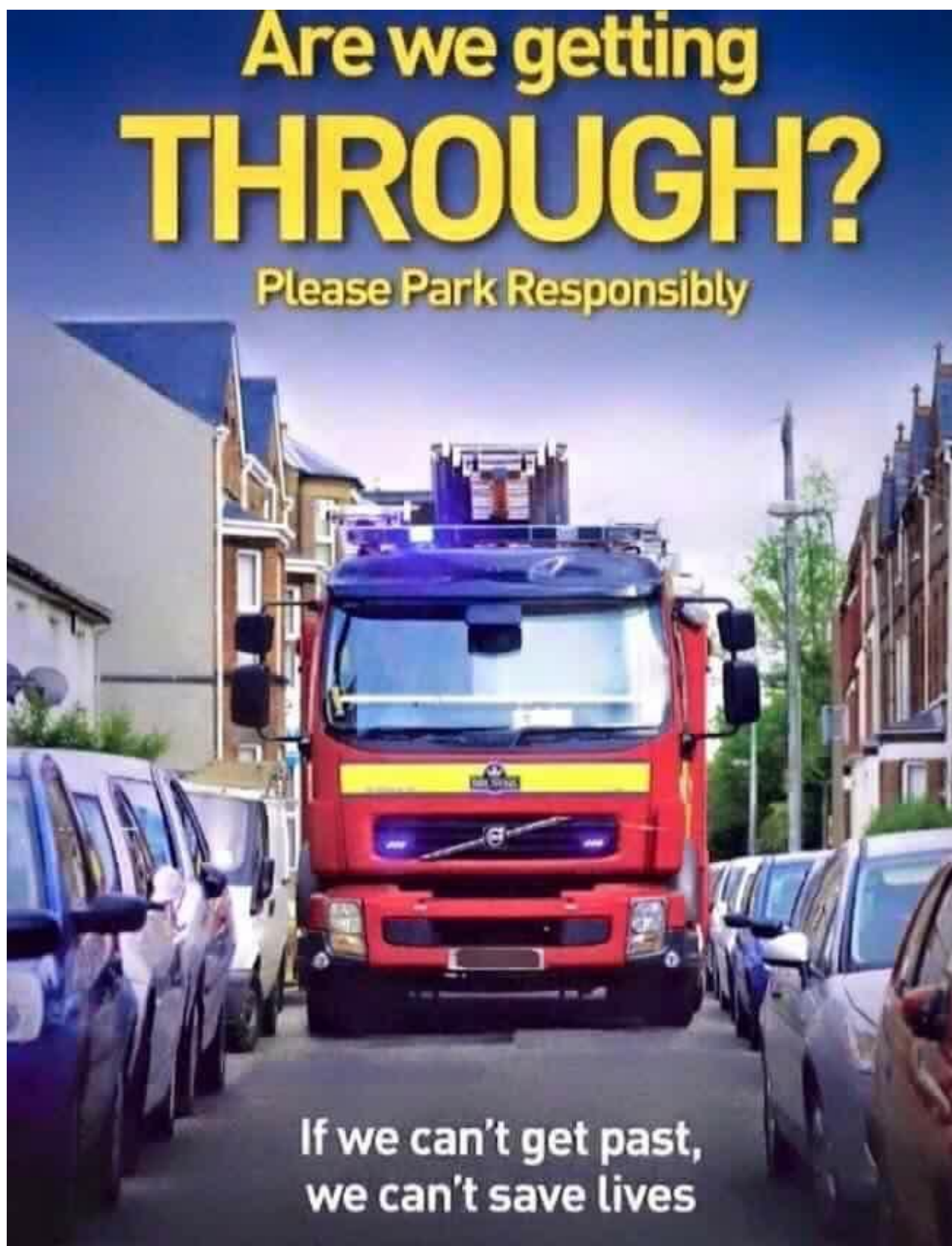
Minutes agreed as a true and accurate record at the Committee Meeting held on 23 March 2021.

SAFE AND SOUND GRANT



Are you in need of additional security measures in your home such as: Additional locks for doors and windows, Door Chains, Door Viewers, Window Alarms or Security Lights?

To qualify for assistance applicants must be:

- Aged over 60 or disabled;
- A homeowner or private sector tenant / Housing Association tenant.

Everyone living in the property must not have a bank balance, when added together, of over £23,250. Further grants will not be made to anyone receiving support from the Safe and Sound grant scheme in the last two years

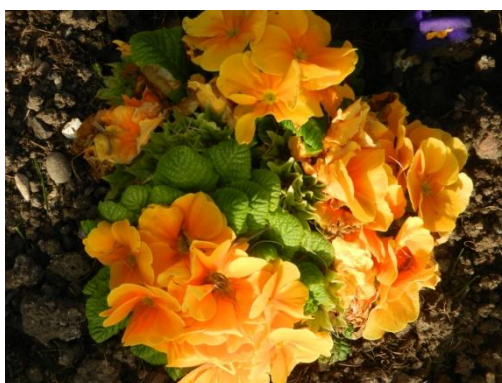
