Parish Council Meetings

Residents are able to see the Parish Council in action at monthly meetings that are usually held at the Methodist Church Hall on Selby Road every third Wednesday at 7:30pm, the next meetings are on **Wednesday 15 October, 19 November and 17 December**. Everyone is welcome if you wish to speak in the public session, please contact Steve Young, Clerk to the PC, five days before the meeting to get booked in.

In addition to the meetings, the PC holds “Surgeries” on the Saturday before a meeting, to allow anyone to have access to Parish Councillors who are in evidence to listen to concerns and views. Planning applications and decisions are available to view. Our Ward Councillor Victoria Aitken will usually be available. If any person has any concerns re: anti-social behaviour in Holme on Spalding Moor or any other issues they feel the Police need to know about, one of our Police Community Support Officers Bill Mell or Simon Smith will be available to discuss them, subject to work commitments. The next surgeries are on **Saturday 15 November and 13 December all between 10am and 12 noon in The Coffee Shop**, in The Courtyard opposite the Blacksmiths Arms. So if you have concerns or questions then please come down to the Coffee Shop Surgery.

Anyone wishing to: receive notice of meetings and/or a copy of the agenda by email; give notice to speak at a meeting; wishes to view current planning applications or any PC document they can contact Steve, Clerk to the PC. If you have any questions, problems or concerns you can contact either Steve or any Parish/Ward Councillor (see page 3).

Street-light and Pot-hole Problems

If you notice a street-light not working please either phone the number on the lamp-post, report it via the East Riding of Yorkshire Council website or email Steve the Clerk with the name of the road, the location and the number on the lamp-post. The East Riding of Yorkshire Council is responsible for our street-lights and will rectify all problems. Pot-holes are the bane of our lives and the East Riding of Yorkshire Council is again responsible for repairing them, it appears that in cold weather they only make a temporary repair which is then done properly once the road surface is warmer. To report problems ring **01482 887700** and ask for Highways or report via the East Riding of Yorkshire Council website with exact location and if possible a picture, the picture seems to help get the repair done more quickly!!

Doggie Bag Dispensers and Litter Bins

The two new litter bins have been sited one outside the Post Office and one on Back Lane and the village is now well covered with bins, the new doggie bag dispensers are being well used. Hopefully this will give no excuse for litter and dog mess to spoil our environment

Grass in the village

The Parish Council has written again to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council complaining at the poor service standards of maintenance of our grassed areas. The Village in Boom entry will hopefully happen next year and the flower beds/planters/baskets are making the village look good, the poor standard of grass cutting is detracting from the hard work done by our local team. The Parish Council has asked to adopt grass cutting so that it can be done to a higher standard

Gallymoor roundabout

Parish Councillors are very concerned at the poor state of this roundabout compared to the one at Ship-tonthorpe and others in the East Riding, again the Parish Council has asked for action to bring this up to standard, work is currently being done

Land behind housing on Cherry and Chestnut, known as Back Field

The Parish Council has discussed this area and is in the process of trying to establish ownership of the area. The Parish Council will then consult with residents backing onto the area and will check out what grants are available before making outline plans for discussion

Child Protection Meeting

In view of recent local, regional and national stories around child abuse the Parish Council has invited the Protecting Vulnerable People department of Humberside Police to a public meeting. They will make a presentation on the work that their department does and take questions. This meeting will take place on Wednesday 29 October at 7.00pm in the Selby Road Methodist Church Hall. This is a public meeting and the Police will make a half hour presentation on the work that they do to help protect vulnerable members of our community and then they will answer questions

Graveyard

The Church is responsible for the existing graveyard and the Parish Council manages the new Cemetery extension, the PC has now taken over the responsibility for cutting grass in the Church Graveyard and after a trial year this year has confirmed that it will maintain the graveyard in the future

Village Hall chairs

The Parish Council has recently obtained a grant of £1350 towards the purchase of 100 new chairs for the Village Hall and has applied for a further grant to buy another 100 chairs

Weirs Pond

Work is being carried out to improve conditions for wild-life at the pond and a trench was recently dug to carry water running off the road away from the pond. Discussions are to be held with The Conservation Volunteers organisation to look at further improvements

Parish Council vacancy

You will see from the front page that an election will take place on Thursday 16th October. The PC wish to inform all residents of HOSM of the relevant procedures and decisions that are required to run such an election. This is for information only to give the PC total transparency for their actions.

When a vacancy occurs the PC advises the EYCC who then run an election on its behalf. If ten or more residents of HOSM sign a form to request an election then the PC is duty bound to continue rather than taking the alternative co-option process at the next PC meeting.

The cost of an election is in the region of £1300 and this money comes from the precept; an amount of money requested by the PC each year to pay for the running of PC business. It is collected by the EYCC via the council tax from residents of HOSM. If an election had not been called and a co-option had taken place it would have been at no cost at all from the precept monies.

In May 2015 the current PC will be dissolved and a new one elected at a further cost.

The election on the 16th October is the third such bye-election in two years due to retirement, resignation and imprisonment; costing the residents of HOSM in the region of £4000.

The PC stands for the democratic rights of the residents, no matter what the cost, however it does feel that residents should be made aware of those costs involved and the other options open for their future reference.

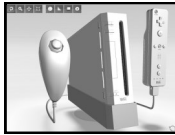
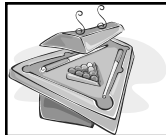

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Dear Residents,

I am writing this after just hearing the very sad news that Ward Councillor Doreen Engall MBE has passed away. I would like to pass on my sincere condolences to her family at this sad time. Doreen has been the Ward Councillor for Howdenshire since the inception of the East Riding in 1996 and before from 1973 with Howden District Council, Boothferry Borough Council and Humberside County Council.

As a very junior Ward colleague I have appreciated the guidance she has given me at County Hall over the last year.

The Summer has brought to light several planning issues across the Parish and I have been working closely with numerous residents to achieve the best outcome for the community. It is important that we encourage development but always with the best interest of the wider community in mind. There is definitely an increase in the number of planning applications in the pipeline which is no-doubt due to the huge national improvements in the Economy. We must have a strong Economy to achieve everything else we aspire to have. The Economy pays for the rest.

Un-adopted roads have been high on the priority list again with issues across the ward. When new properties are built the Local Council does not take over the maintenance and repair to street lights and road surfaces until developers have fulfilled their obligations to complete works to services like drainage, street lighting, footpaths and service roads. This criterion is set so that the ratepayers of East Yorkshire are not footing the bill that should be met by the developer on any new site. Unfortunately, necessary works are not always completed by developers and buyers are not always made aware of the consequences. I think that the solicitor engaged to convey a property should be informing their clients more effectively. It is accepted practice for the purchaser of a property on a new development to hold a financial bond back from the purchase price to cover the cost of completion of any outstanding works to the site. This bond would then be released to the developer on completion of the necessary works. Buyer Be Aware!

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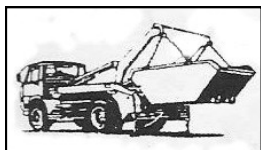
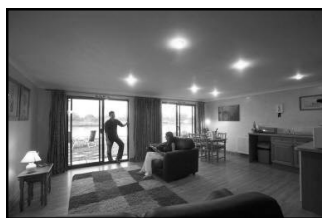

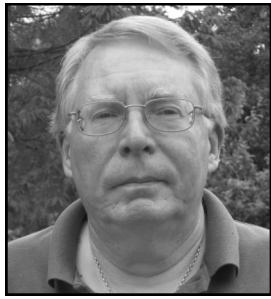
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KARL'S CORNER

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Cllr. Doreen Anne Engall MBE

1924 - 2014

Cllr Doreen Anne Engall MBE passed away peacefully at home on Wednesday 24th September on a bright sunny evening. Doreen will be sadly missed by her family, friends and parishioners including those of the 15 parishes for whom she was representative at the East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

Doreen and Harry Engall moved to the Village in the summer of 1958 to become the new owners of the Red Lion, their eldest daughter Patricia was three and their youngest daughter Therese was only 6 weeks old.

When the time came for Harry and Doreen's retirement they moved over the road into Kingsley. After only a very short retirement, sadly Harry died suddenly in 1974.

Doreen was approached to stand for Election for both the Parish and the Howden District, on her very first election she was delighted to win a seat on both the Parish and the Howden Rural District Council.

When changes were made in local government as a then Howden Rural district Councillor Doreen became a Councillor for the newly formed Boothferry Borough Council. Doreen had two terms of office as the Mayor of Boothferry Borough Council with her daughter Therese as her Mayoress. Eventually the Boothferry Borough Council was absorbed into the Humberside County Council and Doreen held her seat and took up office as a Humberside County Councillor. Each time Doreen held her seat in the local elections. When the East Riding of Yorkshire Council was formed in 1996 she took up her seat for the Howdenshire Ward on the new unitary authority that absorbed all the Boroughs within the new Boundary.

In 1997 Doreen was elected as Vice Chairman to Chairman Cllr Paul Rounding and covered many engagements representing the Chairman when he was at other functions. Doreen took up office in May 1998 as Chairman of the East Riding of Yorkshire Council her Consort during her term of office was friend Ann Dowson. Together over her year of office they attended nearly 400 engagements, including hosting numerous Royal Visits to the region. An invitation to the Buckingham Palace Garden Party was one of the highlights of the year and the saddest occasion was the death of Lady Diana, as a mark of respect, Councillor Engall deposited a book of remembrance with hundreds of signature's and messages of condolence from the villagers of Holme on Spalding Moor.

Doreen's Charity during her term of office as Chairman, raised £15,000 for Guide Dogs for the Blind this amount sponsored 5 guide dogs.

Doreen was presented with a silver casket when she received the Freedom of the Borough of Boothferry.

As a valued Trustee of Holme Parochial Charity Doreen played a big part in helping distribute both Educational Grants and Special Grants.

Doreen was also a Trustee of the Reverend Francis Prowde's Charity. The Trustees meet in the House of Lords once a year and each year Doreen brought back numerous grants for local young men and boys. (Councillor Helen Green is now the Trustee on the Rev. Prowde's Charity and can be contacted at County Hall, Beverley any male between the age of 9 and 25 born and living in the East Riding of Yorkshire can apply for an educational grant.)

Doreen was Chairman of the Humberside Fire Authority and was the first person to be elected as chairman for two consecutive terms of office. Following this she became Vice Chairman and gave support and advice to her successor which was greatly appreciative of her help. She still held this position at the time of her death.

Just a few of the other positions Doreen held were Chairman of East Riding Planning committee; she was on the Board of the Market Weighton Drainage Board for many years; sat on the adoption panel for Humberside; was Chairman of Local Licencing Authority; to name but a few. As a Holme Parish Councillor Doreen has had in uninterrupted seat on Holme on Spalding Moor Parish Council since 1974 and she retired from the parish council in February of this year.

In the Queen's birthday Honours list in June 2013 Doreen was awarded the MBE, the award was presented at a ceremony in the Guildhall in Beverley attended by her family and friends. The award was presented by Her Majesty the Queen's representative the Hon. Susan Cunliffe-Lister Lord Lieutenant of the East Riding of Yorkshire.

As an honorary member of the 76 squadron Doreen each year attended the memorial service held at the Airfield on Skiff Lane, many of the Squadron's members make the journey each year back to the Airfield and Doreen was always there to greet them although their numbers over the years have greatly diminished, she was a close friend of many of the Veterans who attend the ceremony and those that are left will miss her.

Her 90th Birthday was celebrated with family and friends at the White Swan Bubwith, the cards and flowers she received were greatly appreciated, these made her proud that so many sent her congratulations on this very special birthday, a big thank you to all of those who sent their best wishes.

Her last Official County Council Duty was to lay a wreath at the memorial service as 76 Squadron remembered their fallen Comrades, this was only a few days before she passed away.

The Heritage Committee meeting was called to review work to date and plan for the future

1. Review of Heritage Board and work done to date, Gordon Hawcroft reviewed results versus the original grant application and summed up that despite a shortfall in grants the major objectives had been achieved. The dispensers for maps had not been bought and the history booklet is ongoing.

The archive development was a big part of the original plan and Gordon noted comments from LEADER that this could be deposited at Beverley when complete. Carol Kean noted that the History Society will be scanning information onto the website for everyone to have access

Gordon noted that the bulk of the work done so far had been done as an informal group and this had worked well, he hoped that this could carry on. Peter Hastings congratulated the group on achievements

Ann Dowson asked if money from the Heritage Committee will be given to the History Society and Alec Wild noted that the History Society is a separate group and could apply for monies like the Heritage Committee

Gordon explained that he speaks to grant bodies on an ongoing basis to update them on how their money is being spent and what may happen in the future. Gordon said it was important to keep them informed to give them confidence in HOSM and asked if the History Society could keep him updated with progress on the archive particularly Jane Fisher expressed pleasure that the History Society had grown so quickly and so well and this was down to the hard work of the HS committee, all agreed

Ann Dowson said that the HS was working on different subjects to the Heritage Committee and focussing currently on World War 1

In terms of equipment Gordon reported that the Police had contacted him about the computer and have since examined it and reported no issues. He asked where the computer was now

Gordon expressed the hope that the Heritage Committee could move forward as an informal group and involve non-Parish Councillors and asked for views. Ann Dowson asked if the Parish Council needs to be involved in the future, Alec Wild pointed out that it was beneficial in terms of grants, confidence of outside bodies and to generate further ideas

Clerk pointed out that committees work away from the Parish Council but that decisions need to be made at full Parish Council, if it is a PC Committee then it has to follow guidelines set down by the PC. He recommended that plans are approved by the PC and authority obtained to carry them out with any necessary expenditure, should any major amendments to plans be needed then these should be brought to the PC, regular formal meetings would need to be held occasionally

The problem with the error on the Heritage Board and maps was mentioned and this has been put right and when the map is reprinted this will be included in the amendments

2. Future projects, Gordon reported that grant bodies saw HOSM PC as having achieved a major project with the interpretation panel and were keen to support in the future, he said future projects should be as simple as possible and achievable. Ideas were brought forward ie naming footpaths, customising footpath signs, panoramic boards at the Cemetery, bar codes at heritage sites, nature boards, organised walks

The Heritage Open Day to be held on 13 September in the Village Hall was seen as an ideal time to report to residents and to consult on ideas for future projects. Any scheme that comes out of this consultation could then be put forward into the East Riding development plan as decisions will be made towards the end of the year by the East Riding Council

3. Links to Market Weighton canal project and others.

The Pilgrimage of Grace group is interested in developing projects in the local area and would like to get involved with the PC, the Clerk reminded the meeting that the PoG group is making a presentation in Ellerton Village Hall on 29 July at 7.00pm

Gordon Shields of the Market Weighton canal group wishes to work with the PC on the part of the canal in HOSM parish. There is a problem with the Egremont land near the canal and the Clerk recalled correspondence with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council, an update will be requested. The canal group wishes to rationalise footpaths, do interpretation boards and update commonland.

The recent request to link footpaths 12 and 13 by the canal was discussed and Gordon said that working with the canal group should help this situation, Alec Wild is studying the history of the canal and gave information, he said that the PC needs to act soon to protect all footpaths by ensuring they are on the definitive map
Gordon suggested that a meeting should be arranged with Gordon Shields of the canal group and this recommendation was supported, Jane Fisher suggested the East Riding Council officer Steve Howdle could be a useful contact

The Heritage group recommended that it should stay as a Parish Council Committee but run in an informal way to ensure that projects are achieved quickly

It also recommended that the group should attend the Heritage Day on 13 September and following this projects could be discussed and agreed by the Parish Council before grant applications were made

Gordon closed the meeting by asking everyone to think about what projects could be taken forward by the group

Public session,

Ian Jakulis from The Conservation Volunteers explained that they are a national charity whose aim is to bring together volunteers to work on environmental sites and projects. The charity is funded by projects it carries out. Ian has visited Weirs pond with some Parish Councillors and has put together a grant application to be made to WREN to manage the pond, clear vegetation, do boundary work, interpretation board, pond dipping platform etc. A survey was done on the Community Support Day which gave positive results, the WREN application would mean the Parish Council being a third party funder costing £1,600. Parish Councillors questioned the access arrangements to the pond and Ian agreed that this was a problem, Parish Councillors were concerned that a lot of money has been spent on the pond over the years and it is still in a poor state, future maintenance would need to be funded from grants and it was questionable if this would happen. Chairman thanked Ian for his attendance

Sharon Smith spoke about Back Field (grassed area behind houses at the Cherries) and read out emails to and from the Clerk about the poor state of the area plus litter and dog bins. She noted that the area had been discussed at the June Parish Council meeting and was to be mentioned in the Grapevine, she maintained that very few people read the Grapevine and her social media site had been used to ask people what they wanted doing with the land. An e-petition had been set up with 92 hits and she also had 12 paper signatures. She had been in touch with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council and officers were due to visit to assess if the land was suitable for a children's play area. Comments had been made about possible anti-social behaviour and she hoped that this would not stop the project going ahead. October Handy Hints

Now Autumn is upon us, the nights grow longer, the central heating is on and we start the long hard slog until spring, let us look at a few ways we could save time and some hard earned money doing some little jobs in the home.

Check all pockets for money (finders keepers) and tissues which can ruin a whole wash.

Crisp up lace/net curtains by adding a tablespoon or so of salt to the final rinsing water.

To remove candle wax from clothes, chip off as much excess as you can, put an old sheet on the ironing board. Place the garment on top then a sheet of brown wrapping paper. Iron the paper using a medium heat without steam and the wax will melt into the paper. Move the paper around as it absorbs the wax. This method also works on carpets, being ultra careful to keep the iron off the rest of the carpet!

To remove chewing gum from clothing, place the garment in a plastic bag, then place in the freezer overnight. When removed from the freezer immediately scrape off as much gum as you can with a blunt knife. Then rub in a little white vinegar and washing up liquid and wash as normal.

To clean a non-stick iron, apply a little toothpaste to a cold iron and rub it well in with a soft cloth, in small circular motions. Rinse off with warm clean water.

To remove a dent from a carpet, caused when moving furniture, place an ice cube or a tablespoon of cold water in the dent: as the carpet pile slowly dries it will spring back to life.

To remove crayon marks from wallpaper, spray with WD40 and wipe the crayon marks away with a paper towel. Then dip a soft cloth in hot water and a little washing up liquid and rub in a circular motion to remove any marks. Then remove crayons from child.

Don't throw away old toothbrushes, keep them as they are very useful for a variety of cleaning jobs, just remember to keep them out of the bathroom!

To remove mould from tiles around the bath and shower, use a cotton bud dipped in bleach to clean small corners, leave for a few minutes then rinse thoroughly. Be sure to wear rubber gloves and not to splash your clothes when using bleach – I speak from experience.

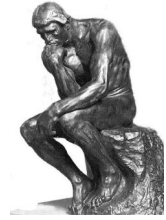

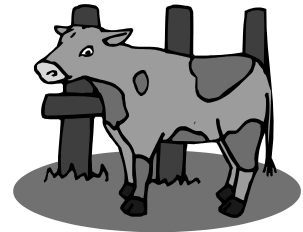

Random Jottings

Herewith a continuation of my historical shopping trip through Holme. Last time I managed to get as far as Runner End, but there are one or two additions before I move on. The cobbler and shoemaker I was unable to name before was Mr Hatfield. Mavis Ward tells me that Eric used to recall that the Ward family of Park Farm family obtained all their footwear from him and would run an annual account which was settled at Christmas when the family would join the Hatfields for tea on bill paying day. Enid Kean says she has happy memories of getting shoes from Mr Hatfield for Sunday School, always black patent leather! I also missed saying that Ernest & I both remember on the site of Rowan Court Mr Wall's coal yard with a nice red brick house and a big shed of which we have a photo. This was followed by Doug Wright's motor car garage and petrol pumps, then Wilkinson's Transport depot, followed by Northern Dairies using it as their transport depot. So many changes we have seen.

I spoke of Mr Eland's shop last time, his initial business was run from the cottage to the left side of the two and Mrs Sergison had a little sweet etc. shop in the other. Both Ernest and our friend Ken Laverack remember the threshing machine being parked in the drive of this cottage, I understand this belonged to Harry Sergison. Previously the Sergisons had been at Common Farm, Arglam Lane and Harry was the best friend of Ernest's father Gervase. My father in law told me many a time how he and Harry walked to Leeds and back to attend big "dos" at Oxford Place Chapel in Leeds and also to Rounday Park Gala. What a long walk for pleasure. I travel on.

Next stop after we pass the Burley families premises with their threshing machines was a small asbestos (I think) built building where as a small child I recall Marie Hill (she later became Mrs Wiles and moved to Bubwith) who had a barbers shop/hairdressers business. My Grandpa Tom Stewart liked to have a shave by cut throat razor and he went to Marie who he said was an expert shaver, she also trimmed what little hair he had, I never knew him as anything but very bald, as well as his ginger moustache. After Marie gave up the shop Monica Plaice (later Mrs Alan Levitt) had a hair dressing business there and I vividly remember when I was about 14 having my first hair perm. I recall that hair was bound up in metal curlers and plugged in to an electric machine to be heated, how things change, although I know it is no longer the fashion I still like to have my hair curled. My sister Judith does it now but the methods have certainly changed. Opposite this building which is no longer there, Mrs Burley has a bungalow on the site, was the Market Garden & Nursery business of Mr Garvey. The house and a large green wooden shed where he sold his produce, as well as the land where it grew is now the Meadowfield housing development. The business also included land across the road where the dorma bungalows stand with long gardens to their rear. From paper work I have Mr Garvey was in business in 1903 so when it started I don't know. We both remember Mr Abell who worked there, he lived in a semi detached cottage (adjoining Tom Ward a gamekeeper) at the junction of Baileywood Lane & Runner End, now demolished and bungalows built on the site. Many older residents will know this as Abell Corner. When Mr Garvey retired the Baldry family came to carry on business there and built a brick shop extension to the side of the house for selling produce. It is not so long ago that Mrs Winnie Baldry moved from the village to live nearer her daughter. On we move towards the Hare & Hounds where Mr Bernard Danby (and his father before him) had a carpenter's shop actually I only recently sent a copy of the report of Isaac Danby's funeral and other bits about the Danby's to someone from Leeds whose mother was a Danby. Mrs Danby did catering when they were Landlord's of the Hare & Hounds. In late 1800's early 1900's the Burley family were at the Hare & Hounds before moving to Kensington House with their threshing business. When I was preparing a piece for the Church Service for the Queen's Jubilee I discovered that in a previous village 1925 Jubilee celebration access for sports in a field to the rear of High Street was through Prior's yard so I assume Prior's were then the Landlords. Mr & Mrs Plaice (also Monica and Christine) I do remember being at H & H. Mrs Plaice did catering from the premises. Mavis Ward says she remembers her mother taking her and Marjorie to have their hair cut by Mrs Habbershaw who took the front room at the H&H once a week for the purpose. Next on from H&H we arrive at Mrs Baxter's shop and petrol pump. When I first knew Ernest he bought his fuel there, it was a single pale green pump which Mrs Baxter operated by hand. Inside her front room she sold cigarettes,

lemonade and crisps and her disabled son Stanley was always sitting by the fire enjoying a chat with customers as they went in to pay. I don't know when the pump and shop closed but it must have been at least late 1950's. Next to the shop was a large wooden building housing the business of another Baxter son Clifford, joiner, wheelwright, builders & undertakers. He employed a number of local men who included Eric Young and Derek Riley who still live in Holme. A bungalow and a house now stand where these two properties were. Across the road another Baxter son, Leslie, worked for Laverack's Butchers all his working life except for War Service. Brian Laverack told me Stanley worked for his dad before being knocked off his bike in an accident which left him disabled, Leslie took his place and never left. The Laverack family have been at High Street for 4 generations, James who died in 1908 when son Arthur was only 8, Mrs James Laverack and her unmarried sister, with great help from Harry Harrison (brother of Tom Harrison the Blacksmith) kept the business going till Arthur had left school, done his butcher training in Selby and come home to eventually take over. He was only just old enough to join up for WW1 but didn't see active service. Sadly Harry Harrison was killed in WW1. My father used to tell us, and Brian says he was told the same story, my father introduced Arthur to Mary Everatt of Barmby Marsh at a dance at Pocklington, they eventually married and we get the next generations of Brian and Timothy. The butchering trade has changed enormously over the generations, they no longer slaughter on the premises and no longer travel round the villages with a mobile meat shop. Next door but one about 50/60 years ago Mr & Mrs Fred Burley built the premises which are now Madge's hairdressers and Mrs Burley opened a wool and all sorts of items shop, it was an Aladdin's Cave of a shop and I was always amazed that Mrs Burley could find what one asked for. I knitted many things for our boys from patterns and wools bought there. Mr Burley ran his threshing and contracting business from the yard at the rear of the property and many local men worked there. The barn parallel to the village hall was demolished and houses are now built in the yard at the rear of the house. Across the road at 65 High Street many may remember (in the 50's I think) Mrs Holtby selling her lovely home made cakes and other baking from Mr Simpson's front room every Saturday morning. The house opposite the Village Hall was a private house until comparatively recently becoming a retail premises, latterly Joffco's Restaurant, but is now reverted to domestic residence. We don't remember Mr George Finch being a saddler next door to this but his grand-daughter Winnie Waby does. We recently had a Finch descendent come to enquire about her relatives and Ernest was pleased to be able to introduce her to Winnie and Dave Waby and visit the Chapel where George Finch had been a Leader. She also visited the Saddlers shop site but the original building was demolished only last year and a new building erected. Across the road was one of the most important shops of the village, Harry Bailey's which we remember so well. Previously it was Collin's General Store, I have a photo of 1903 when it was Collins, I don't know how long it had been theirs. We don't know when Baileys took over but my father talked of going to school with his good friend Guy Bailey and they were both born in September 1910 so I deduce it must have been round 1920. Sadly Guy died young soon after WW2, but I remember when I was a child seeing him sitting in a chair near the front of the shop and chatting to people as they passed by. Baileys sold clothes and all manner of household goods, I have a receipt for a babies pram purchased there with a photo of the baby in the said pram. A lady I know tells me her god mother bought her 3 dresses from Bailey's every birthday, one for best and 2 for school. We have a number of photos of Harry Bailey as he was a great supporter of village events, especially Cricket Club of which he was President. The shop was in the hands of first Collins and then Bailey's for many years but it has changed hands many times over recent years. After Baileys came Lambs, Clarkes, Danvers, Pages all selling similar goods. When Brian Taylor & family lived in the house Sue Taylor had her clothes shop at the front. The property now is owned by the Denness family. TO BE CONTINUED.

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Lemon Meringue Pie

Serves 8-10

Ingredients:

Filling

Grated zest and juice of 4 lemons

4 egg yolks

90g/3oz cornflour

175g/6oz caster sugar

600ml/1 pint water

Meringue

5 egg whites

250g/8oz caster sugar

Pastry

250g/8oz plain flour

30g/1oz icing sugar

125g/4oz butter

1 egg yolk

Cold water to combine pastry

You will need a 25cm/10inch loose bottom flan tin lightly greased

Method

1. Turn on the oven to 200°C/ Gas 6. Make up the pastry and chill in the fridge for 30 minutes. Whilst this is chilling you can grate and juice your lemons and weigh up all other ingredients and put the water on to boil.
2. When pastry is chilled, roll out and line the tin, bake for 10 minutes, remove from the oven and reduce the oven temperature to 150°C/Gas 2.
3. Mix the lemon juice and zest with the cornflour, then stir the lemon mixture into the boiling water. Boil until thick then remove from heat.
4. Leave to cool slightly then stir in the egg yolks mixed with the sugar. Return to heat until simmering, then pour into pastry case.
5. Whisk the egg whites until stiff, then whisk in the sugar 1 teaspoon at a time. Pile on top of the filling and spread the mixture evenly making sure all the lemon mixture is covered. Bake for 45 minutes or until crisp and brown.
6. Serve warm or cold.

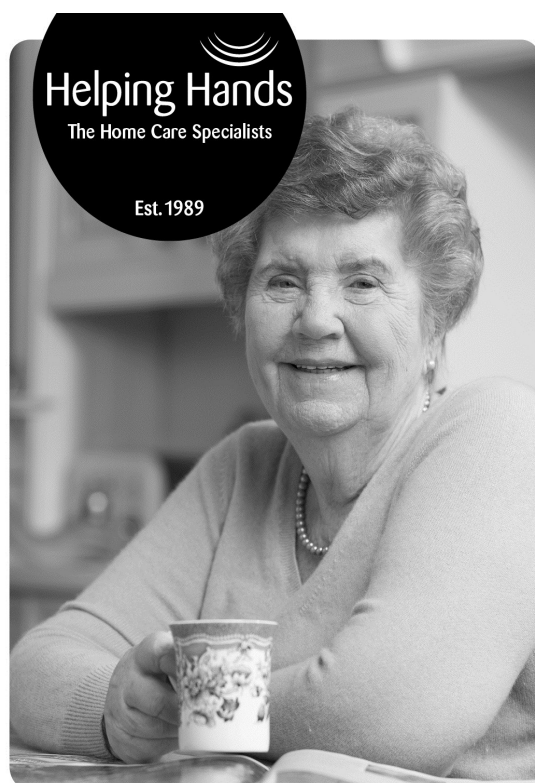

Doing battle against snowdrifts and ice

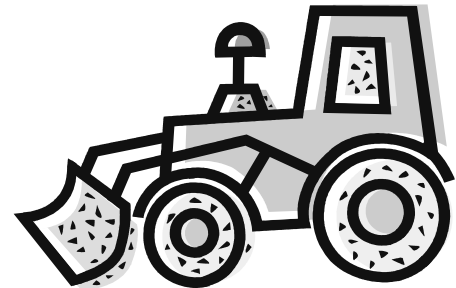
Summer may only just have drawn to a close but winter preparations are already under way. This year's efforts against the weather have been boosted by four new gritters and a new £400,000 salt barn, while essential machinery and vehicles are being serviced ready for action.

It is important to get ready well in advance, as keeping East Riding's 3,500 kilometres of roads moving in spite of snow and ice is a huge task for the council. The council's fleet of snow ploughs, gritters and mobile snow blowers are serviced, drivers are trained and routes well-rehearsed. Salt barns are filled to capacity in complete readiness for winter.

This year, four older vehicles of the fleet of 21 gritters have been replaced. The 60-strong team of gritter drivers have started their training and are carrying out test runs of the precautionary and secondary routes.

The 26 mobile snow blowers, bought by the council last year to treat the busiest footways, are also being serviced and readied for action.

A new salt barn has been built at Beverley Depot, financed through the council's capital programme, at a cost of around £400,000. It has been filled with 2,750 tonnes bringing the total salt storage capacity across the council's depots to almost 17,500 tonnes. The council's salt barns have already been filled to ensure they are ready no matter when the bad weather starts.



The new salt barn creates extra capacity to store salt, ensures supplies are safeguarded, and allow the council to buy at advantageous rates when it restocks its salt in the summer. The increase in salt storage, along with the development of brine production using rock salt, supports pre-wetted treatments which are more efficient than using salt on its own. This means the council will be able to carry out 100 precautionary network treatments from stock held within its depots.

Salt bins are also being checked and re-filled where necessary, so if you see your local salt bin being re-filled this does not mean there is wintry weather forecast, this is all part of the council's routine winter preparations.

Community Transport in the Pocklington area

Beverley Community Lift owns and operates a community bus in the area. Based at Burnby Gardens, it is used daily for morning and afternoon school services. Between those times it is largely idle, apart from two monthly shopping trips to Monks Cross.

The bus could be used by people in outlying villages to get to Pocklington or Market Weighton. Market day transport into Pocklington is a possibility, and there may be other needs like access to the surgery. The vehicle can be hired for one-off events like theatre visits, sports teams, and visits to interesting places.

The organisers need to know if there is demand for transport which could be met by using the bus - anybody who is interested in one or more services on a regular basis is asked to contact John Brown by email at john@jrkbrown.plus.com.

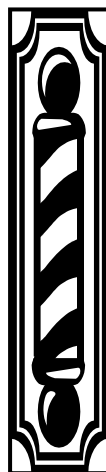

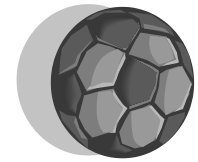
