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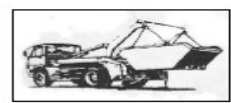

There are always recurring issues and these are shown below – it is your responsibility to report issues – the PC cannot be everywhere all the time. If you don't let them know don't complain!

Street-light and Pot-hole Problems

If you notice a street-light not working please either phone the number on the lamp-post, report it via the East Riding of Yorkshire Council website or email Steve, the Clerk with the name of the road, the location and the number on the lamp-post. The East Riding of Yorkshire Council is responsible for our street-lights and will rectify all problems. Pot-holes are the bane of our lives and the East Riding of Yorkshire Council is again responsible for repairing them, it appears that in cold weather they only make a temporary repair which is then done properly once the road surface is warmer. To report problems ring **01482 887700** and ask for Highways or report via the East Riding of Yorkshire Council website with exact location and if possible a picture, the picture seems to help get the repair done more quickly!!

Doggie Bag Dispensers and Litter Bins

The village is now well covered with bins. Parish Councillors are alarmed at the number of bags having to be bought and therefore paid for out of public funds. Would dog owners please make their own arrangements for buying doggie bags (bags such as nappy bags are very inexpensive from many stores) and use the doggie bag dispensers as a backup. The Parish Council has set up a maximum budget for doggie bags and you may therefore find dispensers empty at certain times, please be a responsible dog owner and pick up your pets droppings.

Child Protection

The main message from experts is to listen to vulnerable people and always report suspicions, they will always be investigated, Ward Councillor Victoria Aitken has given out a "Golden number" to report suspicions 01482 395500

External grants If any voluntary groups in the village need help in sourcing external grants please contact the Parish Council Clerk Steve

Defibrillators, we have two defibs available 24/7 with one attached to the outside wall at the Village Hall entrance plus one on Margaret's DIY external wall. If you have a medical emergency phone 999, the operator will give you the code for the defib box if it is needed, defibs if used quickly can help keep people alive until the emergency services get there

Severe weather, the Parish Council has updated the village severe weather plan to make sure we are as ready as possible for bad weather.

Burial grounds, the Church Graveyard and Parish Council Cemetery have the grass cut by our Parish Council handyman Pete who does a great job for the village. Lots of people have said that they would be willing to volunteer some time, the Parish Council is aware that some people do look after their family graves and this is perfectly acceptable to the Church and Parish Council. This is an important part of village life and the more people that wish to get involved the better

Fibre to the Premises Internet, message from a resident

FTTP - fibre to the premise internet is something I'm working with PineMedia to bring to Back Lane and potentially HOSM generally.

We already have limited FTTP in the village but most of us have to manage with an ever slowing down FTTC (fibre to the cabinet) service.

As I'm sure some of you have seen, the more people who take this the slower it gets for everyone, this is due to the limitations of using the old copper phone line network.

The type of internet connection I'm working on getting is true fibre optic cable direct to your home. In effect you can then do away with the phone line.

PineMedia are keen to work with HOSM residents especially on Back Lane as there is FTTP on demand ability in the village.

Right now, the government offers grant money towards business and residential FTTP installations.

If we can get enough interest it becomes viable to get the FTTP installed. Right now the government has a grant scheme which means every residential address or residential address with a registered Ltd / LLP company gets up to £500 or £3k towards installing FTTP. In effect this

removes the large costs that would be incurred if people looked to do this on a house by house basis; we are in effect pooling the grants to all benefit from low cost, super superfast fibre to the premise internet!

We don't need many people to show interest for this to become a reality.

If you are tired of poor internet and don't want to wait YEARS for anything faster to arrive (its fair to say Virgin / BT / KCOM have no plans and I doubt will roll anything out which is faster for years to come), please go to www.pinemedia.net and register your interest.

Type in your postcode and select the package and click Place Order (don't worry you're not actually ordering the service BUT you are registering your interest in wanting it), the more people we get to do this and show interest the more chance we have of making this a reality!!

Please pass the word and get this out across friends / family and your neighbours, the more the people who show interest and register their details the better!!

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KARL'S CORNER

Looking back it seems I have been submitting 'Karl's Corner' to the Grapevine for well over ten years now, a long time. I have always enjoyed writing, as indeed I enjoy reading: you can't beat a good book be it paperback or on Kindle.

I have been a writer since I was in my early teens, and then graduated to writing articles for automotive magazines. In my fifties I began writing with a vengeance and I'm currently on my third full length novel – a romance as it happens. As regards the Grapevine I think it's time to give someone else the chance to air their views, and so this is my last submission. It has been a pleasure to share my thoughts with you all and thank those of you for the positive feedback I received over the years. I thought it fitting to give you the very first piece I ever wrote for the Grapevine.

Thank you Karl and best wishes to you from all at Grapevine. If you feel the urge to send in some 'Karl's Corner' at some time in the future, please do.

Do you remember – the swinging 60's?

Petite, doll-like, with a frame of short dark hair around her face, Mary Quant first began designing clothes for herself and her friends and I quote: *'who didn't to grow up to have candyfloss hair, stiletto heels and great boobs!'*

Her early clothes did indeed have a child like appeal – pinafores and tent dresses in ultra bright colours, with a decidedly flat bust. She sold her designs from BAZAAR, a boutique opened in 1955 on the Kings Road in Chelsea - the street that became a parade ground for the fashionable young.

However her influence really took off in the next decade – for in 1965 she launched the mini-skirt onto a shocked but enthusiastic world, and soon the 'Quant Look' could be seen throughout the world, her fashion earning her the OBE for her contribution to the export market.

Oct'18

Soon, other designers followed suit: now fashion was not based not on haute couture but the High Street, providing inexpensive clothes for the young.

The focus of the fashion world changed too. John Stephens, the son of a Glasgow grocer, opened his first boutique in London's Carnaby Street in the late 50's. By the mid 60's this little known backwater had become a mecca for the fashion conscious young.

Mary Quant's exciting new ideas helped make London, rather than Paris, the centre of the fashion world in the 60's. Suddenly swinging London and Carnaby Street had become *the* place to see and be seen!

IT'S TIME FOR YOUR FLU JAB!!!

Flu vaccination season has arrived again and there are some important differences to previous years vaccinations that you may want to know about.

What is different?

This year you will receive a different flu jab depending upon your age. Put simply, the jab for the over 65's contains an extra component designed to boost the immune system so that it can make the best response to the vaccine possible. Both jabs vaccinate against the same 4 strains. These new types of vaccinations are arriving at both Pharmacies and Surgeries nationwide in allocated batches, so it is possible they may temporarily run out whilst awaiting the next batch. Please do not worry, enough has been ordered to cover the whole patient population.

Who can have the jab?

As per previous years, it is recommended all over 65's get vaccinated, as well as those in the risk groups. You would normally be aware if you are an 'at risk' patient but these include those with diabetes, asthma/COPD, cancer, pregnant women and carers. If you are unsure if you are eligible for a free NHS vaccination then contact Holme Pharmacy or your GP for advice. If you are not eligible you can still choose to vaccinate yourself privately.

When can I get it?

There is a flu clinic in Holme Surgery on the 29th October at 3.30-7.30pm.

Alternatively you can walk into Holme Pharmacy and have the vaccination at any point from **Wednesday 26th September onwards**. There is no need for an appointment; they offer a simple walk-in service every day that their pharmacist Keith is available. This is available to any eligible patient nationwide, not just those in the village.

Holme Pharmacy can also offer private vaccinations at a cost of £10 per person.

Remember, by vaccinating yourself you are also protecting those around you, by preventing yourself from become a potential source of the illness. The more of the village that get vaccinated, the less likely we are to have an outbreak.

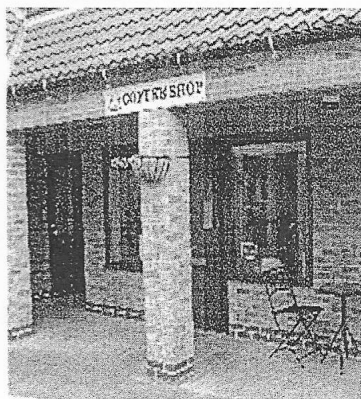

Since Christmas is just about upon us we thought it might be a good idea to include some old photographs of the season of HOSM in the next Grapevine. Over to YOU – sorry if your photograph is not chosen we only have limited space

Second Thoughts East Yorkshire (STEY) Registered charity 1162624

The charity aims to promote good mental health for people living in East Yorkshire and surrounding areas. It was formed because of the low levels of support for people living in rural areas.

What we do

We are not a medical or psychological service and what we do is meant to add to the care and support that the NHS and secondary services such as Community Mental Health Teams provide.

Our first, and primary element, is facilitating workshops for groups of 4-6 people. The participant numbers of each set are kept low so people who may be quiet and withdrawn have the opportunity to join in rather than feeling overwhelmed and uncomfortable in larger groups. They each run for about 3 hours over four weeks, one day per week. The first workshop is confidence building; the second is assertiveness, the third anxiety management and the fourth valuing your own skills. The workshops work on a 'pop up' basis. We hire local venues and invite people to join us up to a maximum of 6 as explained above. We have run over 30 sets of workshops so far.

The second element is offering occasional one to one appointments for people, if they need a little more support before joining group workshops at a later stage.

The third element is providing free transport for people who live rurally to access activities in Hull including woodwork and gardening. We have a minibus which we use to pick people up who are socially isolated so they can join in interesting and meaningful activities. To begin with, we are focusing on people living in the triangle area between Pocklington, Driffild and Holme upon Spalding Moor.

Our fourth element is working with employers on managing stress at work and delivering mental health awareness training. Our aim is to support people to retain their employment rather than having protracted sick leave or leaving work completely.

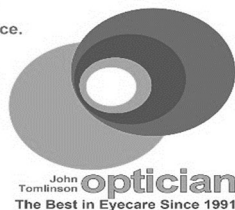
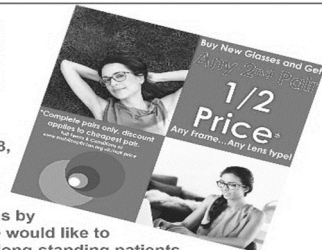
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Holme Rovers Football Club

KEEPING IN TOUCH – VICTORIA AITKEN, LOCAL WARD COUNCILLOR

Dear Residents

WE WON!!! Fantastic effort by all who helped in different ways to fight the recent planning application associated with **the AD plant**. The brochure produced by residents was brilliant and a poster campaign was a great idea. East Riding Council planning committee said

- **NO....** to increasing the amount of waste to be processed at Park Farm from 30,000tons to 80,000tons
- **NO....** to changing the waste material from poultry manure and straw produced on site to recovered food and drink waste ,known as soup, which would have to be transported onto site from out of the area.

This is people power at its best. I am not prepared to let industrialisation occur in Howdenshire without putting up a big fight. This is a farm site and not an industrial site. The principle of AD plants is good but not in a rural location on the edge of a Howdenshire village. We might still need to be ready with pens poised for another round of letter writing if an appeal is lodged by the applicant to try and over turn this decision. Follow me on Face Book 'Victoria Aitken Cllr' or HOSM Community Board on Face Book or read Parish Council notices to keep up to date with anything we hear about the application.

Recently the latest Care Quality Commission (CQC) report into Northern Lincolnshire & Goole NHS Foundation Trust, including **Goole and District Hospital, published a disappointing report**. Although the Trust as a whole improved its overall rating from 'inadequate' to 'requires improvement', Goole and District Hospital has been rated as 'requires improvement' which is very disappointing because it was previously rated 'good'.

Many Howdenshire residents use the services at both Goole and Scunthorpe hospitals, with colleagues at County Hall; I will be speaking with the CCG (Clinical Commissioning Group) to receive an update on how they intend to improve services and what they have learnt from this very disappointing report."

A meeting of the Scrutiny committee has been set for Thursday 27th September at County Hall Beverley.

Holme on Spalding Moor Primary calls out for votes to bag a share of Tesco's bag fund – Steve Woodhouse

Holme on Spalding Moor Primary School is bidding to bag a massive cash boost from the Tesco Bags of Help initiative.

Tesco teamed up with Groundwork to launch its community funding scheme, which sees grants of £4,000, £2,000 and £1,000 raised from carrier bag sales in Tesco stores awarded to local community projects.

Three groups in every Tesco region have been shortlisted to receive the cash award and shoppers are being invited to head along to Market Weighton's Tesco store to vote for who they think should take away the top grant.

Holme on Spalding Moor Primary is one of the groups on the shortlist.

The school has a disused quadrant in the centre of the building that it wishes to develop. As a small school with over 250 pupils, they are desperate to make use of this space. Steve Woodhouse, Head teacher, said 'Our children have asked us to develop a Peace Garden where they can both enjoy and learn about the environment. The space would also be used by our many intergenerational community volunteers who come into school to support our children. At the moment, the quadrangle is just a concrete area with weeds and little else. It doesn't attract wildlife and it certainly doesn't appeal to our young people.'

It is hoped that the Peace Garden will be a new environment, rich with plants and attractive to insects, birds and other wildlife. The environment will also be educational, teaching children about life processes and plant species.

Mr Woodhouse believes the area could also have a wider impact on well-being; 'The project will certainly enhance our school environment and will provide a place for children and adults to reflect, feel calm and talk to each other about some of their issues.'

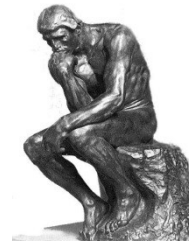

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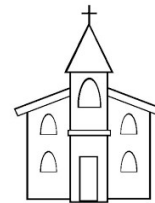
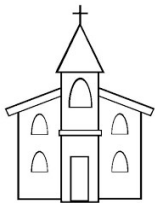

DID YOU KNOW?

Drivers in Britain could soon face a £100 fine for driving too close to cyclists on the road, following plans to introduce a new law. The new law will require motorists to be at least 1.5 metres away from a cyclist when passing or overtaking, with penalties incurred if drivers fail to comply. If a motorist is found to be driving closer than the minimum passing distance, they could be hit with a £100 fine and three penalty points.

Cyclists please make sure you have working lights on your bikes and make sure you are not wearing dark clothing (i.e. wear hi-viz jackets)

Dropped kerbs are there to allow push chairs and mobility scooters an easy way to get off footpaths to cross the road etc so if they are blocked then again this will cause problems to our vulnerable residents

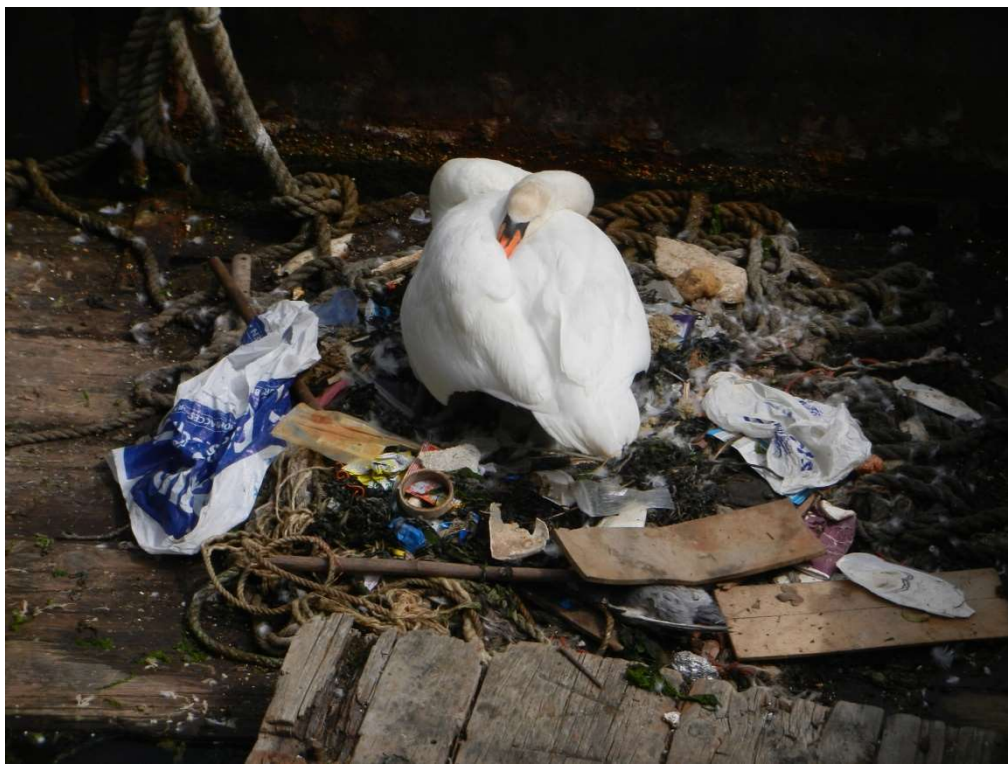
Highway Code - rule 243

DO NOT stop or park:-

- near a school entrance
- anywhere you would prevent access for Emergency Services
- at or near a bus or tram stop or taxi rank
- on the approach to a level crossing/tramway crossing
- opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space
- near the brow of a hill or hump bridge
- opposite a traffic island or (if this would cause an obstruction) another parked vehicle
- where the kerb has been lowered to help wheelchair users and powered mobility vehicles
- in front of an entrance to a property

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- on a bend
- Where you would obstruct cyclists' use of cycle facilities **except** when forced to do so by stationary traffic.
